THE JUSTIN ARBUTHNOTT BRITISH/IRISH FUND (UNIVERSITY OF EDINBURGH): Justin Arbuthnott was drowned with three friends on the night of 27/28 July 1989 when their boat capsized off the coat of Donegal. All four were in their early 20's and were students at the University of Edinburgh. To commemorate Justin, his parents have decided to set up this fund. They state: "If the fund could contribute towards the better understanding by the people of Britain and the people of Ireland of the complex relationships between them and perhaps, therefore, towards making those relationships more straightforward, Justin's death will have served a good purpose." The purpose of the fund is to promote, through scholarly activity, the better understanding of Ireland and the various complex relationships which link Ireland and the United Kingdom. This purpose will be achieved by facilitating through grants and bursaries the study by undergraduate and postgraduate students of the University of Edinburgh of all important aspects of Irish life and the British-Irish relationship.
