DID YOU KNOW THAT THE IRISH FORUM HAS AN EMPLOYMENT, TRAINING AND EDUCATION PROJECT?

Well if you didn't, you do now. My name is Caroline Carr and I am the Employment and Training Development Worker. So why have an employment project specifically for Irish people? Well, a recent study funded by Birmingham City Council found that the take up of education and training provision amongst the Irish in Birmingham was lower than for the population generally and that unemployment levels were higher. The study also found that 91% of respondents were more likely to approach an employment project if it had been set up specifically for Irish people.

Our aim is to act as a bridge between what is available in the city and the Irish community. We can offer advice and guidance on all aspects of training, education and employment, help with application forms and preparing for interviews.

Advice on letter writing and telephone techniques and information about self-employment. We also have access to the Internet for information about job vacancies in Ireland. We can also help you put together a C.V., one of the most important job search tools that you can ever have.

Most importantly we hope to provide culturally sensitive support to those members of the Irish community who want to find out more or get some advice or guidance about education, training or employment. You do not have to have been born in Ireland to use the project; you might be second generation and feel that your cultural identity is Irish.

WOMEN'S ROADSHOW

As part of the project there will be a women only employment, training and education roadshow taking place on Thursday 11 March at the Irish Centre. The hope is that women who would not ordinarily attend something of this nature will attend. If Irish people are generally under-represented in the economic life of the city, then Irish women are practically invisible. So the roadshow aims to attract Irish women particularly. There will be opportunities to find out what is available within the city, gain practical advice about what you can do, assistance with writing your C.V. and an opportunity to try your hand at some activities. There will be benefits advice available from the advice team from the Welfare Rights Unit. There will be a fully staffed créche available so women are welcome to bring their children.

If you are interested in attending the roadshow there are two sessions:

Session One - 1 pm to 4 pm

Session Two - 5 pm to 7 pm

There will be refreshments available between the two sessions and the roadshow will be followed up by a night of spectacular performances - we're having a karaoke.


