On Friday, 28th April, a happy group of pilgrims set off from St. Joseph's in Wealdstone to visit Our Lady's Shrine in Lourdes. In our party were some sick and handicapped as well as helpers and ordinary pilgrims, but we all had one common purpose, namely to experience the peace and tranquility of that hallowed spot in Lourdes, where Our Lady appeared several times to St. Bernadette, before revealing her identity as the Immaculate Conception.

At Victoria Station, we merged with the National Pilgrimage, which travelled by train and boat to Dunkirk, before eventually settling down to the long and arduous thirteen hour train journey in France.
