We wish a speedy recovery to our Vice-President, Tom Bailey who is unwell and is in hospital at the moment.




A Message from your Chairman

A further assessment of the accommodation and facilities presently available and an appraisal of present and future client needs revealed a number of gaps; recreation facilities, though improved over the year, could be better, counselling and interviewing rooms are required and most of all the sleeping accommodation though reasonably comfortable, needs to include a greater number of single rooms.

Plans were prepared and are being presented to the relevant authorities. The renovations will be costly but the work must be viewed as both necessary and urgent if our boys' hostel is to be adequately prepared to meet the challenge of the future.

Hornsey Lane Gardens

The 35 places at the girls' hostel were full almost all the year, even during the winter when traditionally there is a falling off in the number of residents. In all, Sisters Beatrice and Francis gave accommodation to the 174 girls. A further single room was made available and the girls' sitting-room received a much needed redecoration.

The limited numbers in Hornsey Lane Gardens contribute towards the homely atmosphere there but distance from the places of work and entertainment, pose problems for many. We look forward therefore to the opening of the Medway Street Hostel.

Medway Street

Long hours of hard work from Donie Egan, Richard Marks, Sr. Anthony, with her invaluable hostel experience, and the other members of the Medway Street Committee have meant considerable progress with the renovation project over the past twelve months. The hostel is situated in a key city centre area where many of our applicants find employment but where accommodation if available at all, is very expensive. When completed, it will have places for 132 girls. During the year final official approval was obtained and a substantial grant was allocated to the scheme. At the time of going to press, work has commenced on the premises and the completion date has been set for June 9th, 1980.

At this stage, on behalf of all concerned, we would like to offer a sincere "thank you" to Pat Dodson and her helpers who remained voluntarily at the hostel, which was without heat and sometimes light, to see to necessary maintenance, etc., until the keys were finally handed over to the builders. Pat is also our receptionist at the Centre.

Also during 1978

All voluntary and statutory agencies in the London area have a noticeable proportion of Irish people among their clients. We are frequently approached by social services here for assistance with the Irish element of a problem or for background data or information about services in a particular part of Ireland.

discuss ways and means of facilitating inter-agency communication and co-operation we held a day conference at the Irish Centre last summer, inviting representatives of all the major London Voluntary and statutory social services. The meeting was well attended, a useful exchange of information took place and a number of proposals were made. As a result a further conference to discuss the needs of girls coming from Ireland has been arranged and a sub-committee has been set up to examine the possibilities of better preparing young people for arriving here. A further general meeting is being arranged for this summer.

A representative of the Centre was elected during 1978 to the executive committee of the Camden Council for Social Service which is the co-ordinating body for voluntary social services in Camden. The Irish Centre affiliated to the Council at its foundation in 1965. The Centre is also represented on the executive of Camden Council for Community Relations.

In 1978, continuing the trend of recent years, a large number of our clients from counties with big urban populations. (43% from Dublin, Cork, Antrim and Limerick). It is worth noticing, however, that while increases are recorded from Cork and Limerick and a small fluctuation in the Antrim figures, the number of clients from Dublin shows a sizeable decrease (418 as opposed to 525 in 1977). Being an Irish urban emigrant, however, in no way guarantees ease of integration into London life, particularly for those who have brought with them complex social and employment problems. The circle of deprivation and poverty left behind can prove almost impossible to break out of and many show an inability to grasp the limited opportunities available to them.

Numbers from Northern Ireland with some inter-county variations—big increases from Armagh and Tyrone and a decrease in those from Fermanagh—remained more or less the same—196 persons in 1978 and (continued on page 20)

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
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Columba

"Columba" is a play presented by the Adamhus Toakers, CENTRE by Elisabeth Tooms and written by Juliet Boobbyer and Joanna Sciortino.

The Adamnan Players run the company as a co-operative. Most of them are professional artistes, others include a retired naval captain, and an architect. "Columba" was first presented at the Edinburgh Festival Fringe in 1978 and since that time 100 people have taken part in the six productions of the play. All of the company are giving their time and talents free and some at a sacrifice (readers of this Journal know only too well what that means) and gifts of money, large and small, from many individuals have made the enterprise possible.

The musical director is Philip Carleston; designer, William Cameron Johnson; lights by Alan Everett and Richard Bloxage; wardrobe by Anna McLeod; masks by Angie Passmore; stage manager, Alastair Mackenzie; assistant stage manager, Virginia Vickers; company manager, Sarah Cummock; the players are as follows: Chris Channer, Ann Clifford, William Coombes, Blair Cummock, John Holden, David King, Peter McNamara, Denis Nowlan, Angie Passmore and Barry Raymond.

The play itself is in the Gaelic tradition of prose, poetry and music It tells the story of the Gaelic contribution to European, the Dark Ages—ale research and the songs and much of the dialogue are based on contemporary material. The music for a variety of instruments including clarsach (Celtic harp), 'cello, and tin whistle was composed by Elaine Gordon from Cork, with Michael O'Callaghan (University College, Cork), Duncan Morison from the Outer Hebrides, and Hawys Glyn James from the Rhondda. The play depends for its effect on lighting, the use of slides and authentic costume, there is virtually no set other than platforms.

The purpose of the play is two-fold to recall the people of these islands to their spiritual and cultural roots; and to affect the relationship between Britain and Ireland by "changing the structures of feeling." The debt that Europe owes to the Irish is rarely acknowledged. "How can we forget Ireland, where the Sun of Faith rose for us"? Is the last line declared from the stage—the words of a German abbot in the 10th century. St. Columba of Iona turned his back on his dearest ambition to follow the will of God and as a result he laid the foundation of a new age.

"Columba" has been performed in many parts of Britain and as far afield as Switzerland and has been acclaimed by the media as a play well worth seeing.

The play will be performed at the Newman Rooms, Oxford on May 12th to 17th, the McNamara Hall, the Irish Centre, Camden Town, London, NW1 9XB, May 18th to 20th; Croydon Parish Centre, May 22nd; Belmont Abbey School, Hereford, May 26th and 27th; Congress Theatre, Cwmbran, May 29th and 30th; The Rodd, Presteigne, June 6th to 8th; The Cathedral, St. Asaph, June 11th; Alloway Church, Ayr, June 13th; and at Iona on June 29th and 30th, 1980.

193 in 1977. It would seem from our viewpoint at the Centre that people are not at present moving away from the area in any very large numbers.

Our service is geared to best meet the needs of the Irish community but all are welcome to whatever assistance we can offer. During 1978 173 non-Irish people attended: 117 males and 56 females.

Conclusion

Thus it was with our recorded welfare work during 1978. Our initial reception services for newly arrived emigrants, whether they come here with or without social problems, has always been a major part of our work. Increasing numbers, and not only those with severe difficulties, return to us for further assistance—with career guidance, further education, and at the other end of the scale going back to Ireland. Each year also sees an increase in the complexity and number of the many social problems presented by our clients. During the past few years over-all numbers attending at the Centre have remained more or less the same annually but the increase in the work-load has been quite dramatic.

Many of our efforts, as detailed in the report, involve crises intervention. There is no point in telling a mother of three children who has no money and nowhere to go to come back next week for a further discussion of her marital problem. Something must be done immediately to find her accommodation. This work is painstaking and often slow and with the time factor of such complete importance can be very taxing both for the client and the social worker.

We are not happy to limit our service to picking up the pieces so to speak. Our proposed joint information posters and involvement with agencies helping or aiming to help Irish people are indications of this. We hope in the future to become further involved in many other areas of this nature. We have indeed many plans for our future reception, welfare, social and community services for newly arrived emigrants and for the Irish community here. However, we must say again that without an increase in personnel, some secretarial assistance and better facilities, it will be difficult to maintain and develop our present service without contemplating any further expansion.

Finally, we in the Welfare Department would like to thank all who helped us in 1978. Particular thanks to the volunteers who gave so freely of their time and expertise, especially our voluntary typists, to the priests and staff at the Irish Centre and to the County Associations and the Council of Irish Counties who always helped when they could. Our thanks to all at the Irish Embassy and to the various statutory and voluntary agencies here and in Ireland for their co-operation. During '78 St. Marie de Lourdes moved from the Welfare Department to assist Fr. Ryan at Hope House and in September we were glad to welcome back Sr. Joan who had contributed so much during her previous time at the Centre.

As well as the welfare service which is the subject of this report, the Irish Centre has a thriving social and community section, and a very hard working voluntary social committee. Again, these very necessary services are limited at the moment by the lack of physical facilities. However, we would like to remind you that all are welcome at the Centre, whether coming with difficulties, to meet friends at a social function, or just passing by. So do drop in if you can.

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
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
