Irish Centre Hostels, St. Louise Hostel, Medway Street.

After many delays and set backs, the official opening of the newly reconstructed and refurbished St. Louise Hostel, Medway Street, took

place on 5th May, 1981.

Originally opened by the Daughters of Charity in 1933, the hostel accommodated working girls and students; this work of care and concern continued for forty two years. When in 1975 there was question of cessation of this work and the sale of the property, the Irish Centre became involved. It had just become a registered Housing Association, Irish Centre Hostels Limited, and qualified for grant aid from the Housing Corporation, which provided the purchase price of £195,000

and a further £875,000 to rehabilitate the building.

Extensive redevelopment was undertaken. The old style hostel built in 1930 had been replaced by modern cluster group accommodation for four to ten girls. Each cluster unit has it's own single or double bedrooms, kitchen/dining room, bathroom, toilets, ironing room and other facilities. These cluster units provide a friendly family atmosphere for girls aged eighteen to twently-five, who often arrive in London alone and lacking confidence. A very attractive and comfortable television lounge with coffee bar, brings girls together at a focal point. Since the opening took place a small quiet room has been re-adapted and furnished as a very devotional little chapel, where the Blessed Sacrament is reserved and weekly Mass is celebrated by the OMI Fathers who are chaplains to the Irish Centre services.

The hostel is self catering and rent includes all facilities except food. Residency at the hostel allows for a period of adjustment and adaptation to a new work situation in a strange environment before moving to private accommodation. The hostel has a management committee but is run by Sr. Anthony Price, Daughter of Charity, Sr. Edna McNicholas and Sr. Benedict Scahill, both Sisters of Mercy from the Tuam Diocese. The sisters in addition to their management tasks are always available to the residents for advice and support. The Social Workers at the Irish Centre visit the hostel regularly, to follow-up their own referrals

and to offer counselling in specific cases.

The opening service and blessing of the hostel in May was conducted by His Eminence Cardinal Basil Hume. He congratulated the Irish Centre for its hostel work for men and women. "I see this as one more great contribution of the Irish to the Catholic community, not only in London, but throughout the country and it is a joy to acknowledge that . . . . this house is a symbol of love and care, which is the true (continued on page 4)

A Tribute to the late Luke Kennedy, R.I.P.

For the past decade the lengthening days of March heralded a flurry of activity among our members as we prepared for our annual Coach Excursion to Sligo to celebrate the feast day of our Patron Saint; the coming of spring this year holds no such joy for us, it only emphasises the poignancy of the death of our Chairman. He so loved the yearly expedition to Tubbercurry with the excitement of meeting old friends and making new ones.

Luke seemed so indestructible, so full of enthusiasm and 'full of the joy of life' that it is difficult to accept our sense of loss and bewilder-

ment at his passing.

He was a true son of Sligo with an instinctive appreciation and comprehensive knowledge of the music, song, dance and culture of Connaught, he could render a tune on the fiddle or dance a hornpipe with gusto whenever the occasion demanded.

His amazing memory and extensive vocabulary, his enduring interest in people and places made him an unforgettable raconteur and he seemed incapable of forgetting a face even after one encounter.

Luke also enjoyed his work and he pursued his craft with conscientiousness, imagination and consummate skill; he was never too busy for

discussion but still managed to achieve his work objectives.

Involvement in local activities was part of his way of life and he contributed significantly to the management of his church, school and social club. He had maintained a lasting interest in 'The Irish Centre' and had always participated in activities related to charitable fund raising and the promotion of Irish Culture, but, perhaps he will be remembered more personally by many immigrants to whom he gave help and encouragement in securing jobs and living accommodation. Luke will also be remembered by County Associations for his dedication to the Quiz.

This is an opportune time to put aside our own sense of loss and to extend our sincere sympathy to his very charming and accomplished

family with the hope that time will assuage their grief.

During Lukes comparatively brief illness he was an ideal patient and refused to waste his energy on self pity or recrimination. He made a conscious decision to follow the instructions of his physician which he did meticulously without ever losing his optimism or questioning the efficiency of his treatment, and he never manifested a note of dejection or despair.

His greatest joy was to hear friends conversing about people and places of his native County and until the day of his passing was acutely

alert to the news from home.

We are all going to miss Luke so very much and his ready smile and quick wit will long be remembered—The words of Sir Walter Scott seem eminently appropriate.

"Like the Dew on the mountain, Like the foam on the river, Like the bubble on the fountain, Thou are gone and forever."

Luke would not wish gloom or despondency to persist among his family or friends and the thought occurs that as his spirit soars towards heaven, it will linger over his beloved Sligo, particularly adjacent to the renowned Coleman Country, where, one fancies, he will listen again to the haunting strains of the fiddle playing 'Lord Gordons Reel' or 'The Haymakers Jig' on a springtime moonlit twilight.

May He Rest in Peace in Heaven.

## **Aer Lingus News**

New Aer Lingus Services for Britain.

Aer Lingus is to re-open scheduled services between Leeds/Bradford Airport and Dublin, and increase to twice a day scheduled services between Liverpool Airport and Dublin.

The airline will be operating a new type of aircraft, the Shorts 330, on these routes. The twin engined jet-prop Shorts 330, designed and built in Belfast, carries 30 passengers in a spacious cabin.

Mr. Conor McGrath, Aer Lingus General Manager-Britain, said the Shorts 330 was designed to provide economic shorthaul services. "We shall commence the Shorts 330 operation on 1st May," said Mr. McGrath. "It is an ideal aircraft for U.K.-Ireland routes where traffic levels are inadequate for larger jet aircraft. We hope to announce the extension of new services to additional U.K. routes in the near future."

Aer Lingus began flying between Leeds/Bradford and Dublin in 1960 with DC3 aircraft. In subsequent years the airline introduced Friendships, Viscounts and then pure jet services. Low load factors combined with operational difficulties because of the short runway length, caused the airline to suspend services in 1979. Services between Liverpool and Dublin have been operated by Aer Lingus since 1936, the year in which the airline was founded. At present BAC1-11 jets are flown on the route.

Mr. Tony White, Aer Lingus Manager Midlands and North of England, said "By taking this imaginative decision, Aer Lingus will be providing better travel services and facilities for businessmen and tourists. "There will be a twice daily service from Liverpool to Dublin replacing the present single service operation on four days. Leeds/Bradford-Dublin will be served daily except Saturday. There will be a bar, beverage and duty free service on board during the flights."

In future years, Aer Lingus plans to provide similar high frequency commuter services on other U.K. provincial routes to Ireland to better serve the business traveller.

Synge acknowledged how much he owed to the rich and living speech of Gaelic Ireland, "Fiery and Magnificent and Tender" . . . £260 IR. Dates: August 2nd to 26th, 1983.

### **Course Location**

The course will be located at the University's Irish Language Centre (Arus Mhairtin ui Chadhain), Carrraroe, in the heart of Irish-speaking Connemara.

#### Accommodation

From £10 per day, full board. All participants will be staying in modern private houses with friendly Irish speaking families.

#### Credits

The college is, at present, considering the question of accreditation of its summer programmes with a number of U.S. Academic Institutions. Appropriate assessment will be arranged during this course which, it is estimated, should offer a minimum of six semester hour credits.

## Scholarships

A limited number of scholarships will be available for this course. 



## Michael Davitt Memorial Museum

## Michael Davitt National Memorial Committee

Work on the erection of the Michael Davitt Memorial Centre and Museum at Straide, Co. Mayo commenced in Autumn 1982 and will be completed in Summer 1983.

## The Building.

The building contains a large community hall, meeting room, kitchen, cloak room, reception area, storage room, gallery, toilet block and as a museum it will be a 'living' memorial to Irish patriot, founder of the Land League, G.A.A. patron and trade unionist, Michael Davitt who was born in Straide and is buried there. A new booklet on Davitt is currently being printed.

## Special Features.

The building was specially designed to fit in with the adjoining historical 12th century Dominican Abbey. A granite/limestone plaque depicting Davitt and an extract from his will is being erected near the main entrance. A mural of an eviction scene painted on the inside wall will be a reminder of life in Ireland in Davitt's time.

## Usage.

The Centre will be used for local community, social and recreational purposes. It will provide facilities at a broader level for adult education and agricultural training as well as for other groups who have subscribed to the building fund. The Museum will be used to display documents about Davitt and the Land League. Many of these have been donated by his family. The National Museum of Ireland will provide some relevant photographs as will the Commissioners of Public Work. Exhibitions on other famous Mayo people and aspects of the county will be hosted.

## Ownership/Management.

The building and grounds will be owned by a limited company—Cnocan na bPortus Teo.—on which Mayo County Council will have 3 directors. The centre will be managed by a management committee representative of the entire parish of Straide. The Museum and its contents will be managed by the Davitt Memorial committee.

#### Cost.

The building costs are estimated at £100,000. Mayo County Council and the Western Health Board have provided capital grants. No grant was available from government or Bord Failte. The committee have raised over £45,000 but at the end of 1982 £20,000 was still required to complete the building. Donations will be appreciated.
