

Irish Centre Community Services.

Services undertaken in the Community Services Department.

Over the past eighteen months the nature and scope of the services have altered and expanded considerably. Two major factors contributed to this—our new premises and increased staffing.

1. Services to the Newly Arrived: Reception, advisory, information, counselling, referral service, accommodation, employment, repatriation.

Some newly arrived only require an initial service before they establish themselves in the host community.

Increasing numbers however, arrive with complex social, psychological and financial problems. These include pregnant women, psychiatrically ill, mentally or physically handicapped; deserted/deserting wives or battered women and their children; alcohol or drug addicts; youth at risk; runaway youngsters. These require intensive help and supportive follow-up over a long period.

2. Hostels: Conway House (Men's Hostel); Medway Street (Women's Hostel).

Visited weekly (at night) by Irish Centre based social workers, who offer advice, counselling, career guidance information, employment, alternative accommodation.

All we need is a number of sponsors, and I am sure we can rely on the other County Associations to support us. Sponsorship cards will be available soon.

During the evening two bouquets were presented. One to Miss O'Hanlon and the other to Mrs. R. Davis. The latter was a complete surprise and needless to say the kind gesture was very much appreciated. We had many prizes for the raffle, and again our thanks to all the donors.

Sacred Heart Missionaries

In 1876, Father John Neenan, a priest in the Cloyne Diocese and Dean of St. Colman's College, Formoy, was the first Irishman to go to France to join the young band of missionaries. Others followed him and it was made easier for Irish students when, because of the expulsion of religious from France, two houses were acquired in England—Madeley, Shropshire, and Glastonbury, Somerset. Still it was not the ideal set-up and in 1909, a house was established in Ireland to serve as a Junior Seminary. This was known as 'Dyke House' and was to the western end of Cork City—its front avenue is the famed Mardyke and it housed many famous and infamous people, including the hanging Judges on the Southern Circuit. When it was enlarged and modernised in 1921, it became known as the Sacred Heart College. In 1931, at the request of Bishop Cohalan of Cork, a public church was opened to cater for the needs of the people of the area.

In 1936, Moyne Park, Co. Galway, was brought as a Theological Centre, and in 1947, Myross Wood, Co. Cork, was purchased as a Philosophy House and Novitiate. Moyne Park has since been sold and a house ten miles nearer Galway City—Coolarne, Athenry— has been purchased as the Novitiate and the Late Vocations Centre. Myross Wood is now a centre of spiritual renewal in West Cork. All the Theological and Philosophical students are now accommodated in a newly-built House of Studies in Dublin, from where they attend U.C.D. and the Institute of Ecclesiastical Studies at Milltown.

The number of students entering for the priesthood of Cork increased so much that in 1963 a new College was built outside the City at Carraig na bhFear.

From as early as 1889, the Society has been administering the Parish of St. Alban's in Herts, England. Little other work was undertaken in England until 1953, when another parish was taken over in Yorkshire. Then in 1957, a school was opened at Leamington Spa, Warwicks, and on its expansion an old Benedictine Convent School was acquired at Princethorpe, near Rugby, where there is now a College with over 400 students. In the late 1960's further apostolates were accepted in Liverpool—the Parish of Cantril Farm and teaching posts in St. Kevin's Comprehensive School.

While these developments were taking place, all was not static on the Foreign Missions. Since the 1920's, men had been going to New Guinea, and in the early 1950's the Irish Province received their own Mission Field in Northern Transvaal, South Africa, since raised to the status of a diocese. Also around this time men left to do parish work in the Cape Province of South Africa and in the Southern States of America. The latest development in the Foreign Missions has been the undertaking of a new apostolate in Venezuela in South America.

Further undertakings and advancements depend on the present and future members of the Society. Are you going to be one of those?

Our deepest sympathy to Mrs. Nell Cummins on the death of her husband Alderman Joe Cummins who died aged 59 after a few days illness at the City and County Infirmary, Waterford, recently. During his 20 years as a member of the Corporation, Ald Cummins was mayor on two occasions, namely 1974-75 and 1982-83. Joe, R.I.P., was chairman in 1984-85 of the South Eastern Health Board, Chairman of the Association of Health Boards, the latter body was his brain child in order to co-ordinate all the Health Boards throughout Ireland—he was 1st Chairman as well as Chairman at the time of his death. He was also Chairman of the Special Hospitals Committee of the South Eastern Health Board. Joe was Chairman of Waterford Corporation's Roads Committee, a long serving member of the City of Waterford Vocational Education Committee. Alderman Cummins was a member of the Irish Vocational Education Association, in addition a member of the Committee of Management of Belmont Park.

Alderman Cummins was a life long member of the Ferrybank Hurling and Football Club and a secretary of same for 10 years. Joe came back from the brink of death after a serious operation about three years ago and certainly seemed most cheerful and very much alive when he was with us here a few years ago. Besides his wife Nell, Alderman Cummins is survived by daughters Lily Moody (Ferrybank), Maureen Bulger (Co. Wexford), sons Joseph (Dublin), Brendan (Hong Kong) and Jim (Waterford). beaten, or Frank who was found dead on the local Green, or John, discovered early in the morning lying face-down in a hole in the road, or Tommy whose death is still in the hands of the Police. The close relationship we had with them all enabled us to make contact with their families and give the kind of support that was necessary at the time.

Talking of support, we also had many occasions to concern ourselves with offenders and ex-offenders. Not only were our prison visits increased, but the aftercare with many was most important. For a visit like ours is their only contact with a friend during a sentence, and without exception these visits are much appreciated. To quote from a recent letter: "Thanks very much for coming along to pay me a visit. It was good to see you, also the Crack was a break from prison chat that becomes a bit old hat after a while." Because of the complicated system of movement from time of arrest, remand, conviction and sentence, many of these visits would not have taken place were it not for the co-operation of the Chaplaincy team at the various prisons. In particular I would like to say a special word of thanks to Sr. Agnes for her many calls on behalf of our friends and her arranging of pastoral visits.

Although the financial outlay for all services during the year increased by 15%, our fund-raising team not only provided for the increase but created a substantial credit balance for the coming year. Once again, it was the dedication, hard work and team spirit of our helpers that brought success to the Bazaar, Jumble and Furniture Sales and Dances. Besides the Barbecue we had two exceptionally generous donations: one from the Council of Irish County Associations and the other from the Monaghan Association, London. To the many people who supported the activities that made these donations possible, my sincere thanks.

Each year we are grant-aided by the Irish Government and the London Borough of Hammersmith and Fulham. Last year we received what I consider a well-earned boost by the Irish grant being doubled to IR£10,000 (£8,438), while at the same time we received a disappointing $2\frac{1}{2}$ % increase from the local Borough. Although we take pride in the fund-raising done from within, we do also acknowledge and appreciate the importance of these grants and wish to thank the Irish Government and the local Borough for their continued interest and support.

Finally, our thanks to the great number of people who continue to supply the Bureau with much-needed clothing. Your kindness brought dignity and happiness to many during the year. To my Augustinian Community at St. Augustine's in Hammersmith, I wish to express the gratitude of all concerned in the Bureau's activities. We know that without your continued loyalty and encouragement there would never have been a first Annual Report, never mind a fourteenth. And to my colleagues my deepest gratitude and appreciation.
