

PLANS FOR THE FUTURE

Plans for the Immediate Future . . . Grant aid is being sought for three new projects.

1. Day Centre for the Elderly Irish.

The administration has kindly allocated a disused section of the old building for this purpose. A working party of experts has been set up to research and advise, and plans for redevelopment are underway. This project is in response to an urgent need, in an ageing Irish community. The unit will accommodate about 35 people and will hopefully cater for regulars, drop-in and the frail housebound or disabled who will need to be transported. It would provide meals, craft, keep fit, some nursing and chiropody, counselling, advice and information; social and cultural activities and above all companionship in a caring environment.

2. Group Work with Unsupported Women.

This group will aim at strengthening socio-psychological growth for approximately 20 Irish women, who because of marital breakdown, abrasive interpersonal relationships or basic personality problems, are experiencing isolation, stress and unhappiness.

A facilitator, skilled in working with women's groups has already been interviewed and facilities will be available to care for small

children during the session, if need be.

3. Project for the Unemployed.

It is hoped to employ a full time "Outreach Worker", who in addition to the existing "Link-Studies" course, would supervise computer studies, offer formal career guidance and prepare for interviews.

At our first convened meeting for 1986 — 3rd February, a number of fund raising ideas came forward for discussion with a full strength committee sitting, two charities were selected: Cystic Fibrosis Research, Great Ormond Street Children's Hospital and Oblate Mission Brazil

(Provision of Amenities).

Cystic Fibrosis is an inborn disorder which affects the lungs and digestive systems of children. Unrecognised prior to the availability of antibiotics post world war II, it was always fatal — children died in the first year of life. It is a genetically transmitted disorder, 1 in 1,600 receiving this abnormal gene from parents. Statistics determine around 400 cases yearly. Prevention and control of lung infection the all important factor; antibiotics, physiotherapy and high protein diet as symptoms present themselves. There is no cure. The main long term air of research is to identify the initial Biochemical fault which the abnormal gene causes, and from which clinical manifestations must flow. This is being pursued in many countries with increasing momentum. The International Cystic Fibrosis Association throughout the world keeps workers in touch with each other. In the interim period children and their parents have to live through a childhood which may at times be alarming and difficult and they must integrate into their growing lives a variety of treatments which may be time consuming and tedious.

Our second project is for the Oblate Mission in Brazil. I would like to quote a paragraph from the National Director's letter: "Our Priests' work among very poor people who lack the essential amenities of life, living in dwellings that are little better than Hen Houses and despite the vast numbers of people living in confined spaces, deprived of running water and underground sewers some of our priests have organised a work force as the priests in most cases are the only ones these poor people can turn to, to dig and provide some underground sewers. However at present they are handicapped through lack of money." This plea came from Fr Pascal Dillon O.M.I. whom many of you met at our Annual Dinner/Dance 1985 and who succeeded Fr Paddy Sheridan O.M.I. Funds will be shared equally between these two

worthy charities.

We hope you will help to increase membership strength by renewing your Annual Subscription if still outstanding. Our financial year began November 1st, 1985, and ends October 31st, 1986. SOCIAL WORK REPORT

Young People.

Apart from those who come to use from Ireland we meet many young people who are drifting around London from Bed and Breakfast accommodation to Hostels to Squats. They are referred to us by many agencies including Riverpoint, a night-shelter in the Hammersmith area which provides a week's emergency accommodation for homeless people. As it is the only night-shelter in the West London area it attracts many of the alcoholic and homeless people who have deep personal problems. It can be a very traumatic experience for a timid young person who has recently left home to find himself in such an

environment.

Most of these young people come to us penniless with not even a change of clothing. Because they are homeless, unemployed and withchange of clothing. Because they are homeless, unemployed and without financial resources, there is a real danger of their becoming involved in addiction to drugs, alcohol and petty crime. Having come with the mistaken idea that they will get dole money immediately, they are overwhelmed by the complexities of the system and the signing-on procedures. First of all, they have not realised that they need an official document of identification (this year we wrote to Ireland for 67 birth certificates, which means a delay of at least one week); neither do they realise that they need an address from which to make a claim. To avoid the use of unsuitable lodgings the Bureau prefers to pay Bed and Breakfast costs for a few days until Supprefers to pay Bed and Breakfast costs for a few days until Supplementary Benefit is arranged. Accommodation for 465 clients was arranged at our expense in 1984 (£3,037.26).

To many it comes as a real shock to find out, the hard way, how desperate is the Housing situation in London and the exorbitant prices charged. There are few rooms to let in the area and those available charged. There are few rooms to let in the area and those available are beyond the means of most young people, especially when huge deposits are demanded. Most are faced with a future in Bed and Breakfasts with no privacy or security, 3-4 sharing a room, shabby furniture, no cooking facilities and often dirty and dangerous conditions. Those who are fortunate enought to have found accommodation frequently risk losing it because of late and missing Giros and they end up back on the streets again. Very few landlords will allow residents to stay on even for one night if a Giro is late arriving. It is useless for these unskilled young neonly to take up employment as is useless for these unskilled young people to take up employment as they would not earn enough to cover the high cost of their accommodation. (£70 for a single room—£56 sharing per week.)

It is obvious from the above that young people in this situation are

at risk, and unless they are supported have little chance of getting on their feet in this country. To help them we run Austin House, where we can accommodate a limited number of young men between 18-25, when vacancies are available. There is a tremendous need for similar small, homely hostels, not run for financial gain.

Single Homeless.

The state of the older homeless (many of whom are Irish) is a matter of deepest concern here in London. The majority of these men are not alcoholic, mentally ill or 'down and out'. They are ordinary unskilled workers who worked hard while work was available and are now victims of the appalling housing and employment situation.

that the quality of the whole complex will create co-responsibility and

a good cummunal spirit.

The oldest and the only undeveloped part of the hostel, was due to be handed over to the builders on February 28th, 1983, and by that date numbers had to be reduced from 100 to 60. This involved a twofold strategy; the non-replacement of men who booked out and the rehousing by Camden Council of the older long stay residents. Preparations for this began in July 1982, when resettlement officers in Camden were contacted. They proved helpful and understanding in their assessment of applicants' needs and as a result ten men were rehoused in Camden or in G.L.C. properties. By the revised handover date of May 9th, 1983, the numbers were reduced to the required sixty.

A hostel is not just a building but a place where staff and voluntary helpers have established a constructive and caring environment, for the

benefit of the many young people who stay or who pass through.

Perhaps the best acknowledgement for the work done is expressed

by the mother of a former young resident . . .

"I am writing to say many thanks for your kindness to Thomas, who arrived home last night. He seemed delighted to be back home and at first a little ashamed. I took his running away to London without reason, clothes or address, as part of his growing up. I think it's a good kick he needs, but then I always check myself in difficult times and a new approach seems to be the way today. I am so grateful he was lucky enough to come to your hostel. Many thanks for all the care and kindness.'

Housing for Elderly People.

As a Housing Association we have been concerned for many years with the welfare of the elderly Irish people who have become homeless and live in hostels or sub-standard accommodation. Many of these people are in poor health and have lost contact with their families. During 1983 the Association came under some pressure from Irish groups in London and from the Borough of Camden, because of the impending closure of Arlington House, to provide appropriate accom-

modation for homeless elderly people.

After many years of trying to acquire a vacant site adjacent to the hostel, the owner is at last prepared to sell. A project on this site would give elderly people the independence of a private flat, while support would be close at hand in time of need.

Application for funding this project was made to the Housing Corporation during the financial years 1981/82 and 1982/83, but both applications were unsuccessful. An application for £582,000 to accommodate twenty-four people is currently with the Housing Corporation. In addition efforts are being made to seek funding from Camden and the G.L.C.

The scheme is considered a priority and probably the best the Association could develop. It is hoped by next year that more positive results will be evident.

Some Problems Presented.

This year a large number of our young residents came from city areas. They appeared undisciplined, accustomed to staying out at night and getting up in time for lunch. Relationships with parents and the law became strained and many left home for a more liberated environment. The task of getting them to conform to rules was formidable and not always successful. While stating their preparedness to work, the wage they considered their right, at least £80 nett, put many outside the employable bracket. With little or no work experience their productivity value was low and industry is not prepared to carry passengers on its' roll. Some became discontented and returned home; those who were more positively motivated fared better.

Fermanagh Association, London
