Battersea & Wandsworth Irish Group

Since our formation in 1983, Battersea/Wandsworth Irish Group has progressed steadily in the realisation of our aims. We now have our second, week long Irish Festival at BAC to follow last year's massive success, and with your help and support we should have many more.

The BWIG permanent office is now at Tempo House, 15 Falcon Road, with two full time workers.

We run weekly Irish language classes at Lavender Hill School in Latchmere Road and hope to set up much requested Ceili classes locally. There is a drop in centre for Irish people in Balham every Friday and one in north Battersea with one planned for Roehampton. We are campaigning for the positive presentation of Irish history and culture in schools and the inclusion of a greater number of Irish books in the borough libraries. We need parents' help in this. We have Irish traditional music sessions in the Two Brewers in East Hill every Friday evening.

We are also taking a stand on anti-Irish racism and media stereotyping, so if you hear or see anything you object to, let us know.

However, everything is not going so well. With the demise of the GLC, the future of our project, The Battersea/Wandsworth Irish Group – is in jeopardy. We will continue to work to have our cultural heritage acknowledged and subsequent services provided. Our priority now is to seek out alternative funding. New members are always welcome and always needed. So pick up a form or phone the office. There is a 24 hour answering service. We'll keep you in touch. We would like to thank the management and staff of BAC for their goodwill and kind assistance in producing this festival.

All ticket purchasers are required to pay a nominal £1.00 per annum to become an Associate, unless already a Full member of the Centre or under 18. All cards (Associate, Full Member, and proof of concessionary status) must be shown when buying tickets—please remember to bring your card.

Concessions Concessionary prices apply to under 18s, students and UB40s. There are special concessions for pensioners, and for party bookings.

Booking Telephone bookings can be made by ringing 223-8413. The Box Office will tell you how and when to pay for your tickets. Or book in person by calling in to the Centre between 12 noon and 3 pm (Mon and Tues) and 10 am-10 pm (Wed-Sun).

Cafe and Bar The cafe is open 7 days a week (lunchtimes only Mon & Tues) selling a delicious range of hot and cold food. The well-stocked bar sells real ale, draught Guinness and a range of wines and spirits.

Bookshop Open 10am - 6pm Tues 10am - 8pm Wed-Sun selling a wide range of general titles, fiction, specialist subject areas, children's books and magazines. During the Irish festival, the bookshop will stock a number of publications of special interest.

Access The Centre is fully accessible, with a ramp to the front door, a lift to the first floor, hearing induction loops and adapted male and female toilets. Friendly assistance always available.

Travel From B.R. Victoria or Waterloo to Clapham Junction, then 5 minutes walk up Lavender Hill. **Buses**: 45, 77 and 77A stop outside. Nos. 19, 37, 39, 49, 156, 170 and 249 stop at Clapham Junction (5 minutes walk). **Tube**: Clapham Common (20 minutes walk or 45 bus).

Des Donnelly's interest in music stemmed from his father. He was one of five musicians from a family of 11. Des was born in Fintona, Co Tyrone and had just returned from a reception in London, having decided to make fiddle playing his future, when he was tragically killed in Manchester on 12 July 1973 in a building site accident. On that day, Ireland lost one of its most exciting recognition as the man who could set audiences alight.
