Moving Forward in 2000!

The Irish in Greenwich organisation is seeking new paths. There have been previous attempts to fork out and branch into new service provision for the Irish community in Greenwich. Unfortunately and through no fault of the organisation these have been fairly limited and sporadic. However, we have now secured funding from the Irish Government (Díon), for a full-time Advice & Advocacy service which will commence in October. The Outreach pilot project has been in existence since April this year and has over fifty people on its' books. Hopefully, we will have continued funding for the next couple of years' to allow the service to build on its' successful first year. The new weekly Irish Elder's Luncheon Club has begun at the Glyndon Community Centre on Monday's at 12.30pm and the first day was attended by fifty-six people.

This year has also seen a change of Co-ordinator within the Organisation. The Organisation thanks the previous Co-ordinator for sustaining the excellent service provision over the previous eighteen months. The Irish in Greenwich has not forgotten its' roots! This year we are organising an Irish festival at Blackheath Halls called 'The Irish in You'. The theme of the Festival is to promote Irish literature with Irish dance and music. Incorporated into the Festival will be musicians & comedians from other ethnic groups, there will also be a multi– cultural flavour to food and there will also be Caribbean dancing.

This years' Annual General Meeting was attended by over fifty members of the Irish in Greenwich. The Rt. Hon. John McDonnell MP was the key note speaker followed by Maire Gaffney from the Federation of Irish Societies. Other developments that we hope will flourish is our status to become a charity. We anticipate that this will be accomplished within the next few weeks. This will allow the organisation to apply to major funding Trusts and also to save a few pounds elsewhere that can be spent on other needs. Here's to us!!

Outreach & Befriending The Irish Elder Community

Why Outreach?

This year has seen the inception of the Irish in Greenwich's Outreach service. The service has one worker and its' main tasks are to get to elderly Irish people who are in need of assistance and to identify and access those elderly people into services that are appropriate to their needs.

What will it accomplish?

The Irish in Greenwich has been lobbying on behalf of Irish people in Greenwich for a number of years. It has recognised that there are some Irish elderly people who are not doing so well within the community. However, there has been very little statistical information on how many and what are the presenting problems of this group. We hope that the first years' Outreach service will act as a research barometer and get the Council to take notice of the needs of Irish Elderly, particularly those who have fallen through the safety net of housing and health.

What has been done so far?

The service has been running for six months. We are currently in the process of producing a report that will be sent to heads of Social Services and Health., as well as other relevant authorities and organisations. Copies will be sent upon request to members. Here are some of the findings:

- 50 clients have accessed the service. Resulting in approximately 305 hours of contact work.
- The oldest client is 96. The youngest is 55. The average age is 64.
- Approximately 60% suffer from physical problems ranging from Strokes to heart disease and Arthritis to cancer.
- Approximately 25% suffer from mental illness due to depression: Factors in this category range from: Loneliness due to losing a loved one, isolation through having little social network
- There is approximately 45% suffering from both physical and mental health problems.

What is apparent are the effects of the general ageing process. When a client becomes physically unwell and is not getting adequate treatment they will begin to suffer from being in a depressed condition. Some clients are using alcohol as a coping mechanism, whereby this in itself creates a whole new set of problems particularly if there is a dependency on it.

Befriending an elderly person in need.

The outreach service is keen to start a befriending scheme for its' elderly client group. We are looking for people who have a little time on their hands to assist with day to day activities such as shopping or just having a chat. We offer a service that is sensitive to the needs of Irish people.

Advice & Advocacy

The Irish in Greenwich now have an Advice & Advocacy worker in post. The new service will begin on October 2nd 2000.

The service will give Advice on:

Welfare Benefits
Housing
Debt
Pensions
Harassment
Employment
Returning to Ireland

The service will also assist anyone who is in need of using tribunal's or may require help with action in the courts.

Anyone wishing to use the service can either telephone and make an appointment or visit the Irish in Greenwich's premises and providing there is a time slot the worker will see you as soon as possible. (This may mean having to wait for a period of time).

The Advice service will also operate a surgery on Monday afternoon at the weekly Luncheon Club in the Glyndon Centre.

IRISH IN GREENWICH ELDER PERSONS LUNCHEON CLUB

From September 25th The Irish in Greenwich are running a weekly Luncheon Club at the Glyndon Centre. The club will cost 50p per lunch. You will be able to get a tea, coffee and a basic hot meal. There will be a Bingo session and a Raffle with prizes. It runs from 12.30pm - 3.30pm. Transport is provided from the premises of the Irish in Greenwich in Powis Street. If you would like transport to and from the club please telephone as there are only 14 places on the mini-bus.

At the first lunch session fifty-six people attended. In fact this was a bit more than we anticipated. This puts the club in a higher category need for Irish Elderly people. Therefore, we hope, through word of mouth and further publicity we could expect the numbers to rise dramatically over the coming months. If the need arises we may be able to increase the Luncheon club by a further session a week.

The Irish in Greenwich are hoping the club will develop into a community day care operation enabling people to get out of their homes and eat at least one good hot meal a day. We believe that the club could sow the seeds of future development of an Irish Community Care Centre offering a space where all Irish people could meet socially and be able to get assistance with benefits that will assist in attaining a better quality of life.

IRISH IN GREENWICH AGM 2000

The changing face of the Irish population in Greenwich

The following are extracts from a speech given at this years' Annual General Meeting of the Irish in Greenwich by Maire Gaffney – Development Officer for the Federation of Irish Societies.

'Irish born population of Greenwich as of 1991 census is 2.77% of the total population. Taking account of Irish descent this figure rises to 8.31% using a multiple of three recommended in a recent CRE (Commission for Racial Equality) report. This amounts to a population figure of approximately 17,500. By contrast the Indian/ Asian population numbered 7107 in 1991.

Looking at lower social classes the community of Greenwich is polarised. 52% of Irish born are in manual labour jobs, compared to 38% of other white people. In the lowest social class, people with the worst paid, most insecure manual jobs there are 12% Irish born. This compares to 6% white, 7% Black Caribbean and 3% Indian. Therefore Irish people are twice as likely to be in the lowest social class as other white people in the borough and four items as likely as Indian birth and descent.

In 1991 Irish born male rate of unemployment for the over 25 age group was 20%. This is compared to a non Irish rate or 13% and a Black Caribbean rate of 22%. This means that Irish men over 25 were more than twice as likely to be unemployed as any other white person in the borough.

Health is another major issue for the Irish community. 17% of the Irish born population has a Limiting Long Term Illness (LLTI) IN 1991 compared to 13% generally. 27% of Irish households, more than 1 in 4 wears affected by LLTI.

Irish are over represented in homeless populations. They are also over represented amongst some street drinking populations. Alcohol is a difficult subject in the Irish community as it tends to be linked to some stereotypical attitudes to the community. Research shows that Irish are no more likely to be drinkers than the rest of the population, in fact, the Irish are more likely to be total abstainers. Alcohol is sometimes seen as a weakness in the Irish community, despite indications that alcohol is a coping mechanism for those under stress.

Irish advice and support agencies find that the majority of their work concerns benefits and housing problems. Benefits which are particularly problematic are Disability Living Allowance and Attendance Allowance. Irish people often have particular problems communicating with people in authority, they have poor knowledge of systems and procedures and poor knowledge of their rights. Along with a reluctance to be seen as burdensome, this can easily lead to low access levels of benefits and services.

These figures give a rough picture of a community with a large elderly population. Many living alone, a large group with long-term health problems and disabilities. A disproportionate amount of disadvantaged people, uncertain employment prospects and less access to home ownership'.

CENSUS 2001

For the first time the Irish will be considered a separate category in the coming Census 2001 (April). This is essentially good news for the Irish community. Amongst other matters it will give us the opportunity to participate in, at local and national level, a debate on service level agreements to groups who are considered to be of 'Ethnic origin'. That is those people born outside of the United Kingdom and Northern Ireland or those that are of Irish decent inclusive of second and third generation.

For years' frontline Irish service agencies have been up against a backdrop of underfunding. In real terms Irish organisations have hardly seen any growth in monies given out by local and national Governments.

The Census will give us almost the exact population figures of Irish who are residing in the UK. There will be a specific question on whether you are Irish born or of Irish cultural background. There are some sub questions on Irish and mixed cultural background.
