
Arlington House, in North London's fashionable Camden Town district, is Britain's largest hostel for homeless men.

Opened in 1905, it was the last in a series of large hostels built by the great Victorian philanthropist, Lord Rowton. One time private secretaru Disraeli, Lord Rowton was appalled by the squalor of the common lodging houses and was moved to begin construction of huge hostels for

working men, where they could find clean and decent accommodation at affordable prices. The Rowton Houses, as the hostels were called, were a great success.

In the post war construction boom of the late 1940s and early 50s, Camden became one of the focal points for the Irish community in London. Arlington House fulfilled an important role in providing clean and cheap temporary lodgings for the vast number of newly arrived Irish labourers, men for whom the transitory nature of their work made settling down and starting a family difficult.

Toward the end of the 1980s, the constrution industry in Britain collapsed leaving men who had spent a lifetime in the building




trade unemployed, with little prospect of future work because of their age, and with no pensions or savings. Arlington House, which had provided their lodgings through decades of work, now became their home in a time of unemployment and little топеу.

So, despite some degree of public misunderstanding and ever-changing working practices, Arlington House continues to provide housing and sup-

port for the homeless and those in need. It still shelters and supports all cultures, races and creeds today, just as it has done since 1905.

Arlington House is managed by Bridge Housing Association, which runs numerous other hostels throughout London. Through the Leehestia Association, it also runs several outreach schemes in Belfast and will establish sister schemes in the Republic in 1999.

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The Award Sculptures

Our awards this evening portray The Flight of the Wild Geese. After the Battle of Kinsale in 1601, the defeated Gaelic Earls of Ulster left Ireland for Continental Europe. Their departure is known as The Flight of the Wild Geese, probably because the bill of loading and manifesto of the ships that carried them abroad declared them as wild geese so as to avoid detection. Another outflow of Irish followed the Treaty of Limerick; these were also known as Wild Geese.

Many of these emigrants excelled in their new Continental lives, finding diverse careers in such professions as the French and Spanish armed forces, and viniculture: indeed, many of the Burgundy and Bordeaux fine wines still bear names such as Lynch, McCarthy and Barton. Since their flight, the Wild Geese have emerged as symbols of the Irish diaspora.

The award sculptures have been fashioned from bronze and surmount driftwood collected from the banks of the River Bandon. The bases have been hewn from Kilkenny limestone.

The Artist, Dominic Dolan

The Dolan family are famed throughout Ireland for their work in gold, silver and bronze. This is the third consecutive year that they have created the Wild Geese sculptures for The Irish Post, but the first year that Dominic Dolan has had primary responsibility for the design.



Dominic was brought up in Glenmore, Co. Kilkenny where a close proximity to the River Barrow first brought him into contact with Ireland's rich and varied wildlife. Having the use of his father's studio, he created his first sculptural piece at the age of 12.

His education continued at De La Salle in Waterford, and University College Galway where he studied archaeology and philosophy, which were of little use on the building sites of London, where, like so many other young Irishmen in the 1980s, he ended up.


Six months of hod carrying and one bad back later, he decided to desert from McAlpine's fusiliers and pursue the vocation he was born to, that of a silversmith and sculptor. From the silversmiths' workshops of the Clerkenwell Road to Asprey's of New Bond Street and the Great Frog in Carnaby Street, Dominic enjoyed every minute of a four-year stay in London.

Sculpture, a woman, and pizza brought him to Rome in the early 1990s, where, as a freelance designer, he worked for



himself, Gucci and Christie's (Rome) as well as a number of corporate clients. During this time his family had moved to Kinsale and it was here that Dominic eventually returned, moving back to the family studios on a permanent basis.

Today, while other members of his family pursue their own careers – Damian is an engineer, Ben a graphic | film artist – they collaborate on a number of projects, the first one this year being the Wild Geese for The Irish Post.

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
