# Irish in Leeds tackle the Irish Government's Task Force

In January 2002 the Irish Government formed a Task Force on Policy regarding Emigration. This Task Force was set up to tackle issues facing Irish emigrants living abroad. The Taskforce wanted to know about issues affecting:

- Emigrants leaving Ireland today;
- Irish living in the UK wishing to return to live in Ireland: and
- Irish living in the UK but unable to return to Ireland except for holidays due to family commitments, money constraints etc.

In response to this request for information Leeds Irish Health and Homes organised an open forum for the Irish Community at the Irish Centre in Leeds on January 31st 2002.

The evening proved to be a huge success. Topics addressed included the need for information on housing, benefits, employment for returnees; the requirement for the Irish

Government to provide extra funding for Irish facilities in the UK, and special travel rates for the older Irish returning to Ireland on holidays.

Excellent views about what the Community wanted were put forward. One gentleman noted "I would not go back to live in Ireland as my family are here, but it would be great to see the Irish Government extending benefits or discounts to the Irish living in Britain."

Finally, in response to this request for information and from views aired on the evening, Leeds Irish Health and Homes have sent a report to the Task Force. If you would like a copy please contact us on 0113 240 1130.

Last year Leeds Irish Health and Homes organised a trip back to Mayo for some of the tenants that we, as an organisation, sup-

makers was a man from Co. Mayo who had not been back for 49 years.

Many of the people who come with us are in ill-health or purely have never been able to afford to go back. The difference a week's

holiday in Mayo makes to their life is amazing. As a charitable organisation we depend on the generosity of the Irish Community to

fund initiatives like this. Allied Irish have already started the appeal for funds with a donation but with an approximate costing of £7000 to pay for this years holiday we have a long way to go. If you would like to get involved in fundraising or would like to make a

# The Irish Experience in Leeds by Corinne Nicholson

Harehills Irish Music Project and myself, a photographer and community artist, are set to embark on an exciting 2-year arts project to create a community archive for people of Irish descent in Leeds.

We realised that, unlike Manchester or Liverpool, Leeds has no publicly accessible collection of recordings. photographs or writings for the Irish Community. Our plan is to create a visual, musical and written archive that can be accessed by the public and that will create awareness about and within the Irish population in Leeds, as well as being a celebration of music history in the area.

This will be done through a series of photography, creative writing and web-design workshops working with different community groups of all ages, pre-dominantly in the Harehills and Chapeltown area. These will include, amongst others,

groups existing within Early Years Centres, Hareholds Irish Music Project and Leeds Irish Health and Homes. I will also be documenting through photographs and interviews, the diverse range of Irish events and organisations in the city.

Material from the workshops reflecting people's lives, meropries and hopes for the future, will culmina in a series of exhibit ons, and will also commute to the 'Irish Experience in Leeds' website and book. Through participating, those involved will have the opportunity to work in a group to develop new skills in the arts, photography, design and computers.

This innovative project will allow people from the community to create their own visual archive and decide

how they want to represent themselves and 'The Irish Experience In Leeds'.

The above headline recently appeared on the front page of The Irish Times newspaper. While we cannot promise that you will discover that Ali is a long lost relative, we can, among other things, equip you in your endeavours to explore your family tree and wider sense of Irishness.

At Leeds Metropolitan University you can now undertake a Certificate (HE) in Irish Studies. Established in 2000, Irish Studies has attracted over

60 students to date who have studied a wide range of modules including: Irish Family/Oral History, Irish History. Irish Politics. Women and Ireland, Irish Language (Gaelic), Contemporary Issues in Modern Ireland, The Experiences of the Irish in Britain and Irish Myth. With university approval, we hope to offer two new and exciting modules on Irish Music during 2002/2003.

Because the course is parttime, usually one evening per week, flexibility in the delivery of modules is paramount. To obtain the award of Certificate (HE) Irish Studies, students must successfully complete eight of the above modules.

If you are attracted to a specific module then we are happy to facilitate a single module learning experience. Ordinarily, the course begins in October and finishes in June and is delivered over two semester's i.e. October to January and February to June.

# Institutional abuse

There has been a lot of coverage in Irish press recently about the abuse suffered by Irish children in the 1950's /1960's and 1970's where the state had a responsibility for their care. This includes industrial and reformatory schools, orphanages, children's homes and special needs schools including orthopaedic and Magdalena Laundries. This runs on from the scandal concerning abuse within religious congregations from the same era.

The Irish Government have set up Survivors Outreach Services in Sheffield, Coventry, London and in near future Manchester. The Outreach Workers aim is to provide support, advice and information to survivors of child abuse whilst in institutional care in Republic of Ireland. Eileen Burn, York-

shire Irish Survivors Outreach Worker commented: "We have already had a lot of response to our service and I would like to highlight that it is a completely confidential service. We can organise to meet people where they feel comfortable whether that be at our offices or in their own home and we can look at any aspect of support they may require".

Irish Traditional Music and Culture.



### **ESTABLISHED:**

1996

WHY: A steering group was set up in 1992 in response to the high number of single Irish homeless people in Leeds and the disproportionate number of Irish people admitted to hospital under the Mental Health Act. We became constituted in 1996 and our initial funding was from Leeds Social Services

HIGHLIGHT: I was told by one of our tenants that the support we provided had 'saved his life'. Such open and honest feedback is the most important tool we have for shaping and delivering the development of our services.

FRUSTRATIONS: Despite the recommendations of the Commission for Racial Equality Report in June 1997, 5 years on very few of the recommendations have been put into practice by agencies that adequately address their responsibility to the Irish community in Leeds.

### **HOPES FOR THE FUTURE:**

To see appropriate levels of culturally sensitive provision for the Irish in Leeds and to see the fruition of our tenants wishes for a comprehensive day-care and support centre.

Thicker than Water is a book of Irish stories edited by Gordon Snell.

The book is a collection of short stories written by prominent modern Irish and Irish-American authors.
