Was Senior Lecturer in Sociology at Sunderland University, where he was Director of the Local Studies Unit; now Lecturer at Cardiff Business School, University of Wales. Co-editor of, and contributor to, Ireland's Histories (Routledge 1991), co-author of The Nissan Enigma (Mansell 1992). Has contributed to Soar Valley Irish Studies Conference, Lipman Seminar on Ireland and History Workshop. Believes that BAIS must be a broadly based organisation, representing the diversity of perspectives and interests within it. He supports commitment to developing Irish Studies in community education and schools.
