ENGLISH CENSUS: CELTIC LANGUAGES

Thank you for your letter of 3 November in which you comment on the need for a question on the ability to speak a Celtic language in the 1991 Census.

You may be interested to know that the Parliamentary announcement on 2 November that there would be a census in Great Britain in 1991 (Hansard Vol 121 No 36 Col 573) stated that the Registrars General for England and Wales and Scotland would be consulting users of census statistics. Submissions from users were also invited. Proposals for the census will be published in a White Paper next year.

The process of putting together a proposed census package from the many demands for questions will not be easy since it will need to be acceptable to and not an undue burden on the public who have to complete the forms. A question on the ability to speak a Celtic language directed at the whole population of England and Wales would only be relevant to a very small part of it. However all requests for questions which are practicable and for which there is a substantiated and well defined need will be carefully considered.

As you refer to Census forms for Northern Ireland a copy of your letter and this reply is being sent to the Registrar General for Northern Ireland.
