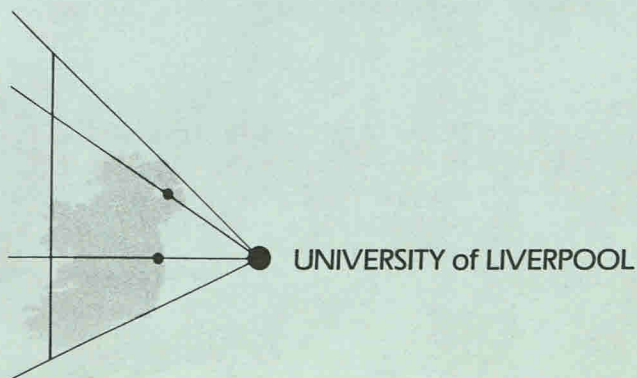

This conference is being organised as part of the Joint Education Programme being developed by the British Association for Irish Studies and the Institute of Irish Studies to raise the profile and status of Irish Studies in schools in Great Britain.

Aimed at promoting the teaching of History and Humanities in a multi-cultural context in secondary, further and adult education, the conference will review recent writing on key issues raised by the study of the Irish in Britain; examine the range of primary sources available for use in the classroom; and discuss some of the problems raised by the practical application of primary source materials in school-based studies of the Irish in Britain.

Workshops will also provide the opportunity to devise active learning methods based on the use of documentary evidence, particularly the development of empathetic and differentiated learning techniques.
