

PREFACE

This second Survey has taken nearly eighteen months longer to prepare than I would have liked. In part, the delay has been occasioned by the heightened pace of BAIS activities, for as the Association has extended its scope so the demands on its (voluntary!) Officers for action on urgent issues have increased – to the detriment, sometimes, of matters that could be deferred. Having said that, it is more satisfying to note that the expansion of the number of entries, from 186 in the first Survey, to over 380 in the present exercise, has been accompanied by an increase in the correspondence associated with the exercise and that that, too, lengthened the task.

As with the first Survey, I have received assistance from a number of people and it gives me pleasure to be able to thank them. North Staffordshire Polytechnic and, in particular, Dr John Shelton, made the whole exercise possible by providing the equipment on which the Survey returns were initially edited and the desk-top publishing suite on which the final draft was typeset. The Polytechnic also made available grants through its Research Funds to set the Survey in motion and the Association is pleased to acknowledge this support. At various times, Ms Muriel Fielding, Ms Ann Harper, Mr Lawrence Driscoll and Ms Lynne Evans assisted with entering and editing Survey returns and despatching material. More recently, I have been grateful for Margaret Wood's advice as she worked through my first efforts in typesetting; I can only hope that my accuracy will improve to match her meticulous standards. Finally in this record of indebtedness, I would like to join Ruth Dudley Edwards in thanking Bernard Canavan for the speed and professionalism with which he produced the cover illustration.

It is customary for authors and compilers to assume responsibility for all errors and omissions, which I do. In carrying out this Survey I have been very much aware that any mistake on my part could misrepresent someone's passionate interest or achievements and a further reason for the delay in its appearance was the circulation of the draft entries for correction in August 1987 – which produced a further 50 entries in addition to corrections! If, despite the care that Margaret Wood and I have taken, there *are* errors, please accept my apologies but also please do write to me with the corrections so that I can make amends in our next Survey, which will be expanded to cover teaching activities in primary, secondary and further education.

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
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
