# Irish Government Funds 11 New Jobs in the Voluntary Sector

DION the Irish Government Committee for Welfare Services Abroad announced shortly after Xmas the second round of grants amounting to over £250,000 for the current financial year which was distributed between 18 voluntary organisations.

11 new full-time jobs have been created with this funding and 13 voluntary organisations have received funding for the first time.

The funds will be used by groups to provide and develop services to homeless families, women, youth, housing agencies, employment issues and health care.

Full time posts have been created in the following organisations:

Islington Women & Mental Health Group King's Cross Homeless Project Rugby House Project Kilburn Irish Youth Action Group Brent Irish Advisory Service London Travellers Forum CARA Irish Homeless Project An Teach Housing Association New Horizon Youth Centre Sheffield Gypsy & Travellers Support Centre Positively Irish Action on Aids.

AGIY have learned that the provisional funding timetable set by DION for the

financial year 1990/91 is likely to be as follows:

- publications of funding guidelines in early March
- closing date for applications forms in early May
- 1st issue of grants in mid-June
- 2nd issue of grants in early November.

## RTE Telethon People in Need Funding Decisions

16 voluntary organisations working with Irish people in London have received funding from the People in Need Trust.

A total of £75,000 was distributed with grants ranging from £300 to £40,000.

At the presentation ceremony held in London last week it was announced that People in Need would not have an input from Britain in this year's Telethon fundraising event.

There is concern that funding by the Trust to groups working with Irish people in Britain may also be stopped.

## **Agency Profile**

## Innisfree Housing Association

Innisfree was the first Irish housing association in London to use short-life housing for single homeless Irish people.

Established in 1985 Innisfree aims to provide housing to those people who are either homeless, imminently homeless or living in unsatisfactory conditions and who also have little chance of finding suitable alternative accommodation.

Innisfree H.A. are particularly concerned with the housing needs of the older single Irish homeless with a history of living in hostels, lodgings or sleeping rough. Now with the increase in Irish youth emigration to London, Innisfree is addressing their housing needs and currently provides accommodation for over 100 people.

Innisfree is supported by Paddington Churches Housing Association, Network Housing Association and the London Boroughs of Brent, Camden and Ealing. Last year Innisfree obtained registration with the Housing Corporation which will enable it to gain access to central Government funding and develop permanent housing schemes for homeless Irish people in London.

#### **Catherine Coleman House**

Catherine Coleman House is a medium stay mixed hostel for older Irish people managed by Innisfree. It provides accommodation for six homeless Irish people between the ages of 35 and 59 who are not considered in priority need under the Housing Act 1985. Each resident has their own bedroom while kitchen, lounge and other facilities are shared. The hostel has a non-resident part-time worker who offers support and assistance on welfare benefits, employment etc. House meetings are held with the residents every month, so that each resident can air their views, ideas and any problems that may arise.

#### **Ealing Hostel**

In March this year, Innisfree will take into management a new high quality six bed mixed hostel which will provide accommodation for six homeless Irish people between the ages of 35 and 59. With a full time hostel worker the hostel will have similar facilities to Catherine Coleman House. Referrals are likely to come from local housing advice centres and London Borough of Ealing.

#### **Housing Corporation Funding**

Innisfree will have its first permanent housing scheme funded by the Housing Corporation coming into management in June this year. Innisfree will now be able to provide three self-contained one bedroom flats as move-on accommodation for residents from its hostels and short-life housing stock.

#### Short Life

Most of Innisfree's residents at present are housed in short-life accommodation in Brent, Ealing, Camden and Harrow. The maximum length of stay depends on the length of life on the property. Properties are normally licensed to Innisfree for at least six months.

Several of Innisfree's short-life residents are currently taking part in a self-build housing co-operative where they will design and build their own housing in London. Innisfree is also working closely with the Migrant Training Scheme (MTS) and provides short-life accommodation to young people on MTS who are in housing need.

#### Referrals

Innisfree accepts referrals from a wide range of housing/advice agencies as well as self referrals. All referrals have to complete an application form and will always be interviewed by a member of Innisfree's staff before obtaining accommodation. Innisfree keeps a waiting list of applicants for housing which is regularly up-dated.

If you are thinking of making a referral it should be remembered that there are great demands on Innisfree's limited resources.

#### **Further Info**
