Lectures will take place at 7.30 p.m. in the Muriel Stott Conference Centre at the John Rylands University Library, Oxford Road site. The Open Evening on 16 March will take place at the Deansgate Building of the Library at 7.00 p.m.

# IRELAND FROM ALL ANGLES

he rich heritage of Ireland - its culture, history and people - are being promoted by an independent organisation founded three years ago to highlight the value of Irish studies. The British Association for Irish Studies has no political allegiance, is non-sectarian and has quickly gained status through the partonage of many notable people in business, the Arts and education.

From its offices in London's West Endcourtesy of the Rowntree Trust - the association seeks to persuade those in all areas of education to develop courses in Irish studies. Seán Hutton, who came to Britain in the 1960s and has a background in teaching as well as being a writer in the Irish language, is full-time executive director for BAIS.

Other prominent professionals supporting the association include Chairwoman, Ruth Dudley Edwards - the biographer and historian; businesswoman Detta O'Cathain; Seamus Heaney, Professor of poetry at Oxford University; the historian Robert Kee and retiring chairman of Allied Irish Bank, Dr Niall Crowley. Government Ministers from Britain and Ireland, as well as the Irish Ambassador in

London, have also attended functions organised to promote BAIS.

As part of its education programme, BAIS has held several conferences for sixthformers in Northern Ireland in conjunction with the province's education department. The conferences, which included students from all religious backgrounds, were hailed as a great success, addressing difficult chapter's in Ireland's history, particularly the period 1912-1923. With sufficient funding, it is planned to repeat the conferences next Spring.

Liverpool University and the Polytechnic of North London are the first British seats of higher education to offer a degree course in Irish studies with another subject, to be followed in 1990 by St. Mary's College, Twickenham. "Higher education is a very important part of our strategy in promoting Irish studies. Our research has shown that there is a lot of interest from people of many nationalities - not necessarily those with Irish connections," said Seán Hutton.

At the schools level, BAIS is involved in the Joint Education Programme with Liverpool University which has set up 'A' level courses in Irish modern history and is working on a

syllabus for a GCSE in the Irish language and Irish studies. Training for primary and secondary teachers is provided under the Joint Education Programme, and BAIS has developed a series of Irish language examinations in conjunction with the Institute of Linguists for adult education classes.

BAIS produces a twice-yearly newsletter and publishes a survey of Irish studies in Britain, as well as organising conferences, seminars and public lectures.
