



Minutes of the Annual General meeting of the
Council of Irish County Associations held at
the Irish Centre, 52 Camden Square, N.W.1
on Sunday ^{27th}_{T.B.} February 1966

The Chairman Mr. James Conway presided.
Delegates as per the register were present
together with Mr. Sehar representing His
Excellency The Irish Ambassador Mr. J.G.
Molley.

Apologies were received from Rev Fr. Owen
Sweeney and Mr. S. Beckett.

A greetings telegram conveying good
wishes was received from Mr. Beckett
and letters from Alan Connock.

The Chairman opened the meeting and
welcomed all delegates to the meeting.
He introduced to the meeting Mr. O'halloran
who was representing a group of shareholders
of the National Bank who were protesting
against the take over bid.

Mr. O'halloran outlined details of take over
and its effects. In thanking Mr. O'halloran
the Chairman said owing to the nature
of the business of the day no discussion
would follow Mr. O'halloran's report.

Standing Orders were unanimously adopted.
In his opening address the chairman
thanked all present for the support
given to the Office and himself.
The President in his address paid

tribute to the work done by the officers of the council together with the officers of the various county associations. He said that County associations should carry on the charitable work they were doing.

Appointment of Tellers:

Messrs James Gaffin (Waterford) Owen Branigan (Offaly) and J. Vaughan (Cork) were appointed tellers.

On the proposition of Mr Wise it was decided to take as read the minutes of the last AGM. as they had been already read and signed.

The secretary in his report dealt with the affiliation of new counties and of the part played by these associations in the country. Dealing with the Social side he said that we could look back on the year with a certain amount of satisfaction. He thanked the Chairman and President for their generous donations throughout the year. He also thanked Dr Moore, Fr Kiley and others who helped in our social functions. On the Annual Dinner he said that this was a very successful function and all were to be thanked for their efforts.

The secretary thanked all Counties for their support in the Cambridgeshire Draw. Also the Individual Dirs together he congratulated Mr Beckett for winning the Dirz and thanked the Organisers & his helpers.

Thanking his fellow officers and County Assoc and delegates the secretary thanked all for their cooperation throughout the year. He also thanked all the newspapers. He also expressed his thanks to the Lush Centre for the facilities given to the Associations & the Council. It was agreed that Secretary's report be available 2 weeks prior to AGM. The Chairman, Secretary, Treasurer & Ass. Secretary were returned unopposed. The Outgoing Vice Chairman Mr Noonan stated that he was not going forward. The Chairman thanked Mr Noonan for his service to the Council.

Two contestants were forward for the Vice Chairman's position, the result being Mr. Gerald O'Slynn (Galway) defeating Mr. Dan J. Waterford.

The Treasurer gave a detailed account of the year from the Executive Committee elected 15 March ^{before Stephen} with all the officers were E. Mr. H. Ryan would act as Auditor. Messrs. J. Vaughan, J. W. P. J. Neill, W. Barlow, P. Byrne & D. Butler together with Miss Conway Inglis. A motion by the Health Association was withdrawn by the proposer.

Arising from any other business
On the proposition of Mr Barron a letter
was to be sent to British Railways, The
Irish Government stating that

of British Railways on increasing their
fares was deplored".

The James Conway, Chairman presided
at a well attended meeting of the
above, held at the Irish Centre,
Camden Town N.W.1. on Wednesday April 20th

& called on the Hon See to read the

discussion arose, with many delegates

& Messrs. T. Wyse & John Trehan Longford.
It was also decided to publish the first
issue in June 1966. & to request
County Secretaries to supply information of
functions etc or before 27/4/1966 &

to concentrate mostly on County functions
for the first few editions of the Monthly
Newsletter with expenses of same to come
from Council funds.

Correspondence.

Correspondences were read from Mr P. Walsh

Society, requesting names & addresses of
County Association Officers. (Granted see
to supply same) & Mr T. Wyse agreed
to supply notable artists for Concert programmes.

A. was also added that automatic

was decided to purchase a trophy
for £10. & to request Mr Sparrow to discuss
the matter with the O'Neils.

THANKS.

At this stage, Mr Tenny O' Flynn moved a
vote of thanks to the Kilkenny Association
for their kind hospitality on the occasion
of the last General Meeting when the
Mayor of Kilkenny met them. The vote seconded
by Cavan was endorsed by other delegates.

Resolution - Mr John Teehan, Longford who quoted extracts from paper cuttings etc. gave an ac/c of the intended closing down of Longford Co. Hospital. After long deliberation on the matter, the following resolution was carried on the proposition of the Speaker, Seconded by Mr Tom Gilleron, Roscommon. That this Council fully support the protest of the Longford Ass. in London at the proposal of the Irish Minister for Health, to close the Longford Co. Hosp. & it deplores the tendency to concentrate the medical facilities, paid for by the nation as a whole, in a few large Centres.

Treasurers Report - The Hon Treasurers Mr M. Walens submitted a detailed report, which showed a credit of £378-7-1. to date: On the proposition of Mr T. Beckett, Seconded by Mr P. Byrne, the report was adopted & congrat's voiced by the above in conjunction with Mr Cafferkey for an excellent job rendered by Mr Walens. Replying to a question the Hon Sec, informed the meeting that the 14 dinner tickets were still unpaid for, but cash should be available for same by next meeting. On the Annual Cambridgeshire Draw, the Treasurer requested an early distribution of Tickets & it was agreed that Centres ^{who} request tickets should pay cash for receipt of same on the basis of £30 per £10. proposed by Mr J. O'Byrne. Seconded by Mr T. Vaughan. On the matter of donating £100 to the Welfare fund at The Irish Centre. An amendment of Mr R. Daly Galway Seconded by P. Quigley Derry. that the motion be deferred. To the Executive Committee to fully discuss the matter, defeated.

The Proposition of Mr T. Beckett. Seconded by Mr J. Vaughan. £100 be donated by 27 Votes to 9.

St. Patrick's Parade Committee

The C'man thanked all for their part in this year's St. Pat's Day Parade. Good observations were voiced by Mrs R. Wyse. & Mr Clinton Dublin re the arrangements & the Parade. & the Sec. T. Murphy concludes the report in notifying the delegates of the A.G.M. of the above at

British Railways

The Hon Sec reported having written to British Rail & Board Failte re a levy on sailing boats to Ireland. It was decided to close the matter for the moment & to have an editorial comment in the 1st Newsletter.

Many functions for the coming month were submitted by delegates. This concluded the business of the meeting. Progress was reported by the Chair who thanked those present for their attendance & the next meeting was fixed for Wed May 18th & the Irish Centre in a special Executive for 11/5/66.

Minutes of Monthly Meeting held at Irish Centre 52 Camden Square on Wednesday May 18th 1906.

Mr James Conway C/men presided at the meeting of the above & welcomed delegates & apologised for the absence of the Hon Sec. Mr Maurice O'Connor who was unable to attend owing to illness. & hence no minutes or Correspondence were available. Apology from Vice C/men Mr J. O Flynn was also tendered.

The C/men gave a detailed account of the Executive Committee meeting of the 11/5/06 regarding the £100 donation to the Welfare fund at the Irish Centre. On the proposition of Mr Vaughan Clare, seconded by Mr Noonan Limerick the recommendation was passed & the presentation to be made at the next monthly meeting which was then fixed for June 15th. It was also passed to request the use of the Kennedy Hall for the meeting on this & every occasion where possible.

On the matter of the Annual Dinner / Dance fixed for the Gresham Ballroom, The Archway for Thursday Nov 10th, several delegates remarked that a Steak menu was not a suitable one for a Collective Dinner Party & after a discussion it was agreed to request a list of menus from Mr T. Gorman. On the subject of the main guest, an amendment of Mr T. Clinton, seconded by Mr P. Byrne was carried by 29 votes to 7 defeating the Council Recommendation.

that the name of Dr Ramsey be added to the two main guests of Mr Sean Lemass TD. An Tionscar & His Excellency Cardinal John Heenan, Archbishop of Westminster. Mr F. Beckett, who arrived earliest informed the Chairman that he was the appointed Credited delegate of the Sligo H.S. on the Council, & Mr Waters Hon Treasurer apologised for giving a different view at the last Executive meeting.

The Hon Treasurer in his report showed Cash in bank of £396 - 2 - 0. today with a £3 profit on Bacon & Cabbage Dinner & £11 deficit on the Annual Dinner/Dance, last November. Some ticket money was still outstanding & he hoped to tie up the matter with Mr O'Connell the hon sec. before the next meeting. The Report was adopted on the proposition of Mr Vaughan, seconded by Mr Clive Fogarty (Clare).

Approval was given for Down to enter the 1966 Quiz Competition v. Donegal, when the organiser Mr Waters, stated that this years competition was getting off to a very slow start. He also announced that the 1965 final would be held on May 23rd at the Irish Centre Galway v. Sligo. & it was also agreed that the tickets for the Cambridgeshire Draw would be available on the night. amount of revenue could be received from this annual fund raising went. He also stated that the hon. Minutes of Irish County Ass. meeting 15-6-1966

The June monthly meeting of the above presided over by C'man, Mr. James Conway, and held at the Irish Centre, Camden Town, N.W.1, on Wednesday, June, 15th 1966, attended by most of the 25 Counties affiliated to date as per signed attendance sheet.

The chairman declaring the meeting opened, welcomed the delegates and apologized for the absence of Mr. R. Daly, Galway and the Hon. Sec., Mr. O'Connor who would attend presently. He also apologized for the holding of to-night's meeting in the Staff Dining Room due to a function in progress at the Kennedy Memorial Hall, in reply to questions raised by Waterford delegates. in aid of Executive Funds at the Asanmore, Ballan, on Friday, Sept: 9th Tickets 5/- each, 6/- on Doos and a resolution that all affiliated Counties be responsible for 4 Tickets at £1 was unanimously carried.

Permission was also agreed to allow credit to Counties to accept the Raffle Tickets for Cambridgeshire Draw and to return cash for same to Hon. Secs, as soon as possible. On the matter of investing Executive funds in Irish Bonds, the matter was deferred to the Executive.

At this stage, MR. O'Conor, Hon. Sec. arrived and the minutes of the April & May minutes were then read, approved and duly signed by the C'man on the proportion of T. Noonan & T. T. Wyre. MR. P. Byrne, much pained the matter if all recognised delegates were notified of to-night's meeting? and the Hon Sec replied in the affirmative.

The question of the Newsletter was again before this meeting and after a request that at least 50 words be submitted to the Hon Sec at which every County represented at the meeting agreed ^{to}, it was decided to hold a meeting of the Editorial Board shortly with the view of having the first copy ready for the July meeting. Longford Resolution

Mr. Tony Clinton, Dublin, raised the matter of the wisdom of the Council's resolution in connection with the recent ^{alleged} closing of the Longford County Hospital as ^{passed} at the last meeting and pointed out that the Dublin Association wished to be dis-associated with the resolution.

The Chairman Mr. J. O'Flynn presided together with officers and delegates as per the register. An apology was received from the Secretary who was absent through illness.

Minutes of the previous meeting were read and adopted on the proposal of Mr. Murphy seconded by J. Vaughan.

Arising from the minutes an enquiry from J. Griffin (Waterford) about the availability of the Irish Centre Hall on 25th May was referred to the special committee dealing with the hall for allocations.

There was no correspondence read.

The Treasurer gave a detailed account of the income and expenditure since the last meeting. The Bank Balance stood at £234-13-8. The report was adopted on the proposition of Mr. (Offaly) seconded by J. Brady. Mr. Waters told delegates the final of the Individual Quiz would take place in the Irish Centre on 23rd January.
