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PAYING GUESTS

I think I was about seven when my parents decided to move from our little house in Trinity Street to a somewhat larger house on the outskirts of the town; of course, houses were easy to find in Drogheda at that time, although the money was a bit scarce. When we settled into our new house my mother found that a little careful re-arrangement left her with a spare room, which she decided to rent on a paying guest basis to augment her somewhat limited housekeeping money.

The first guest was Mrs. Nicholson, always slightly tipsy, her tall black bonnet, like a Spanish mantilla, worn at a jaunty angle, and her black "sateen" cape, and long black skirt rustling like the leaves of Spring. She was sober the day she arrived, and her distinguished appearance made a profound impression on us. When she announced that she was the widow of a-gallant soldier who had been killed in the Crimean War, we children were overwhelmed with awe. The Crimean War meant nothing to us, but it made Mrs. Nicholson mighty important in our estimation. Whether her story was true or false, she never lost an opportunity to lament in the local hostelry: a performance which, at the time, made her almost an outcast of her sex. She could be seen any evening floating up the street like a ship in full sail on a slightly choppy sea, then she would retire to her room and chant "Rule Britannia" with the fervour of a hymn.

She arrived home thus one evening when we were playing a new game called Halma, a kind of cross between Ludo and Snakes and Ladders. On seeing the name printed on the box which contained the game, Mrs. Nicholson was overcome with a burst of alcoholic emotion, pouring forth a stirring story of how her poor dear husband had died in the battle of "Halma" in the Crimea, and forthwith acquired our precious game as a memento in his memory.

Whatever we may have thought of Mrs. Nicholson's valiant husband, we took a decidedly poor view of her choice of a memento, and held a hurried conference to devise a means of recovering it. The plan was simple. I, being the youngest, and the most gullible, was detailed to go and search her room as soon as she left for her visit to the hostelry. Not being a master of strategy, I made no attempt to cover up any evidence of my visit to Mrs. Nicholson's room, where I found no trace of our game, and saw little else but pictures of a soldier wearing a high collared tunic and a pill-box type of headgear, which was held in position by a strap under his chin. The picture of the soldier convinced me that Mrs. Nicholson's husband was, in fact, a hero, but in spite of this I did not feel it incumbent on us to pin a medal on him in the form of our game of Halma. So, I failed in my quest, but the cold war with Mrs. Nicholson had begun.

The following night she arrived home in her usual exuberant mood, retired to her room and burst into "Rule Britannia". By a pre-arranged signal we immediately gathered beneath her window and started to sing at the tops of our voices, "God Save Ireland says the Hero". Unaccustomed to any form of competition with her solo efforts, Mrs. Nicholson stopped in the middle of a bar, pulled up the window of her room, and glared down at the circle of choristers below. The sight of Mrs. Nicholson, florid and furious, sent us scurrying in all directions; my eldest sister, Maggie, tarried a little, however, and Mrs. Nicholson bellowed down at her:

"Be off with you you young faggot"

"What's a faggot but a bundle of sticks?" Maggie promptly retorted, and that was the first salvo in the hitherto unrecorded second Crimean War.

The winner of the November Prize Bond Draw was Mr. Philip Donoghue of Kenton in Middlesex.



PROPER IN BRITAIN
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NEW GENERAL MANAGER FOR LONDON TARA HOTEL

The well known Irish Hotelier, Mr. Eoin Dillon, has been appointed General Manager of the London Tara Hotel. The announcement was made on the 27th November by the Chairman of the Hotel Board, Mr. Neil Gleeson, who is Assistant Chief Executive; Corporate Planning and Economics of Aer Lingus-Irish. The hotel company is an Aer Lingus subsidiary.

Mr. Dillon, who has been in the hotel industry since 1947, will take up duty in the London Tara on 1st January, 1974. He trained at the Savoy in London during 1950/52. Among the Irish hotels with which Mr. Dillon has been prominently associated with are Dublin's Gresham and Shelbourne and the Imperial in Cork. He is a council member of the Irish Hotels Federation and a founder and former President of the Irish Hotel and Catering Institutional Management Association and the Cookery and Food Association.

Welcoming the appointment of Mr. Dillon, the Chairman of the Hotel Board, Mr. Gleeson, said that his wide experience of the industry, his well established reputation for high standards and his enthusiasm for the concept of Irish hospitality would be substantial assets to the London Tara. "The hotel industry in London," he said "has been beset by many problems this year, and the Tara did not escape its share. However, we have made a good start, and business continues to improve. We have identified the problems of the industry and of the hotel, and we look with confidence to the future".

"I have no doubt that the London Tara will quickly consolidate its good start under the personal direction and expert management of Mr. Dillon", he said.

The 850-bedroom London Tara is a subsidiary company of Aer Lingus-Irish. It cost over 8 million pounds. Since February it has accommodated a total of some 198,000 guests and was the venue for 65 major conferences and exhibitions. It has a staff of over 400.

The Most Rev. Dr. F. McKiernan, Bishop of Kilmore, paid tribute to the Officers of the Association in fulfilling the ideals of the founder members, in his speech, as follows:

"Mr. Chairman, I am honoured to be your guest tonight and I am very grateful to the Committee of the Cavan Association in London for having invited me to attend. It is plesaant for me to come here, and to meet many old friends.

This is a magnificent function here tonight. Its success is a fine tribute to the efforts of the organisers, as well as a clear sign of the healthy state of your Association. I know your Association is flourishing because of the good work it is doing which you, Mr. Chairman, have referred to. Your work for good causes here and at home, for the Irish Centre and its activities here and for the School for Handicapped Children in Cootehill, is very praiseworthy. I congratulate you and thank you I know you will consider the satisfaction of helping others less well off than yourselves to be sufficient reward

"I see I am backed up by a strong team from home tonight, though our two all-Ireland Footballers — Father Hetherton and Peter Donohue might not fancy our chances of winning an All-Ireland. Maurice Jackson and myself are past our best and too good home care seems to have added weight problems to others, notably the Development Officer But it is nice that so many have come, and only right that we return the compliment and come here occasionally when you people come so often to Ireland. We are glad to see you come. The popularity of the Emigrant at Home Weeks and festivals bears out this. It is very important for the economy of the country; but truth to tell, the people in Mullagh and Munterconnaught, Killeshandra or Kildallan, Crosserlough or Corlough, worry very little about the economy of the country, but they are very glad indeed to see their own kith and kin come home year after year. It is good for them and good for you too. I like to think that it is an opportunity for you to restore your energies, both physical and spiritual. May it always remain so.

It is particularly gratifying to see many of our exiles returning home to stay. It is a most welcome turn of the tide. It is good to see farms bought and stocked and reclaimed by the money that was earned here. It is good to see technicians coming back with the skills and expertise acquired here and helping to build up our young Irish industries. It is good, too, to see Irishmen investing the money they have acquired here, in factories and industries in Ireland — a flattering vote of confidence in the stability and prospects of the Irish economy. It all helps. It is a very practical form of Christian patriotism.

"There are opportunities in Ireland for all grades of workers, skilled and unskilled The Cavan County Manager and County Development Secretary are here tonight, and they will be glad to furnish any information a person needs who wants to return home. But could I just add a word of warning? Make your plans properly before you transplant your roots. In the interests of your wife and family you need complete up-to-date information not only on the job and wages but also on housing, schools and educational opportunities. Many things have changed recently, eg, you can pass your exams now without Irish, but it may take a considerable time to get a house. All this information can be got from the Development Officer. Your success here in Britain is very


