



### Seven Different Houses to see in Co. Kildare

I have talked to most of the six builders who are setting out different types of houses in the lovely village of Leixlip at Captains Hill. The builders are working in close harmony in order to keep the village atmosphere by building a variety of houses ranging from two and three bedroomed detached and semi-detached bungalows. There are three



bedroomed two-story semi-detached also four bedroomed semis. The houses have prices to suit most pockets from £24,995 to £30,500. Cooke & Foley are building two bedroomed bungalows and four bedroomed semi-detached houses with a half red brick front. Tighlinn are building three bedroomed houses which are half bricked with a good fitted kitchen and fitted wardrobes as standard in two of the bedrooms. Kola Construction have three bedroomed semi-detached with a through lounge divided by Georgian doors and fully fitted kitchen, fitted wardrobes in all bedrooms with the added attraction of a fitted dressing






Annual Welfare Report, 1980 (continued)

**Annual Statistics** 

The following figures indicate the number of people who used the Centre's Welfare Service from January 1st to December, 1980

The number of new people using the Centre shows a decrease of 8.2 per cent over last year's figures. This slight decrease has, however, allowed for a more intensive follow-up and supportive service to both new and old clients, which shows an 85 per cent increase over 1979.

Hard Times

Our 1979 report made a gloomy prediction about the employment scene but did not anticipate the full implications of this until the latter months of 1980, when the impact of the cuts in Government expenditure made itself felt. The recession affected the Irish community in a particular way:—

- Government cut-backs seriously restricted local Government expenditure resulting in widespread lay-offs and redundancies in the construction industry which absorbed a substantial percentage of the Irish workforce.
- A slump in tourism caused many hotels to close whole sections of their buildings, resulting in the loss of both work and accommodation.
- Licensed premises which also provided work and accommodation were doing less well and needed less staff.
- Trained or skilled people (unless their skill was scarce and highly specialised) were not getting into business or industry because of an "intake freeze."

The shortage of jobs has somewhat stabilised the labour market. In March, 1980, out of a total of 1,411,700 registered unemployed in Britain, 29,300 were school leavers. Of these 12 per cent. were girls and  $5\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. boys. In 1966 there were 280 job vacancies for every 100 unemployed young people; in 1980 there were 24 vacancies for every 100.

#### Youth Report (continued)

#### 5. Miscellaneous

The Sub-Committee has restricted its enquiry to the narrow field covered by this report. There are many areas not covered by this enquiry which the Federation may wish to investigate in depth.

Many studies are being made into the Irish Community, and the

Many studies are being made into the Irish Community, and the Sub-Committee recommend that the Federation should examine the findings of these studies.

There are many other organisations outside the Federation such as Proprietary and Parish Clubs which are predominantly Irish whose experiences may be useful to the Federation.

Youth organisations in general can help with ideas, experience and

expertise and should be approached for assistance.

Whilst this report has concentrated on second generation youth, the sub-committee have not ignored the Irish born youth. The sub-committee realises that most of the youth are of the second generation and the Irish born are in a minority. They it is hoped already have a commitment towards Ireland and their experience will be beneficial to their second generation peers. The sub-committee, however, have tried not to make any distinction between the two groups as youth should be regarded as a single albeit homogeneous body.

6. Conclusion

At the beginning of this report, two questions were formulated. Most of the discussion has been concentrated on giving some answers to the

second question.

The first question posed what should be the role of youth in the federation as a whole. To this question there is no definitive answer or set of answers. The question can only really be answered by the youth themselves. This is why the sub-committee feel that they should have

a platform to enable them to do this.

The sub-committee are aware that many people would like to see this question answered by the responses that youth should ensure the future of Irish Societies, and give leadership to the Irish community of the future. No-one however can say with any conviction that this is what youth will want to do and it may well be that our societies will die out with their Irish born members. Certainly without the adoption of many of the proposals framed in this report this may well be the likely demise for most of the societies. At the very least their unique Irishness may well be lost if it is not also shared by the second generation. If this happens then in the sub-committee's view it is tantamount to the demise of Irish societies as at present constituted The lessons of the Davitt clubs are a clear reminder of this.

Many societies have substantial investments in property and funds and quite properly hope that what they have built up will continue and

The committee would hesitate to present this report as an exhaustive dissertation on the question of youth and fully realises its limitations. It is however a report of the activities of the committee and is put forward as being of some limited value to what should be a continuing enquiry by the federation. The difficulties experienced by the committee should not it is submitted detract from the value of the proposals and recommendations made in this report.




