To my dear husband Wally on the sudden death of his mother Mrs. Elizabeth Smyth who died peacefully at Westminster Hospital on

Tuesday, 17th November last.

Mrs. Smyth was a great ambassador for Waterford and will be remembered for the civic reception she recieved from Mayor Fad Browne when she presented him with a scroll from Mayor Linsey of New York. Mrs. Smyth appeared on television with the Mayor of New York and when reporters came to interview her in New York she told them how proud she was that her son was Chairman of the Waterford Association London and the lovely lakes and mountains of New York

State were almost as nice as Waterford.

All the above from an English woman who loved Waterford. Mrs. Smyth was born in Southport and on her mother's side was a Furness of Furness Abbey, on her father's side was of the Threlfal Ale Company. Elizabeth's father was the well known musician who travelled the world with his music and ended his days as Music Master of the Barrack Street Brass and Reed Band, many of his compositions are still played by the band. I remember old Granny Threlfal telling me she married in Boston as Grandad was on a tour there, she told me her Mother sent two solicitors with her from Southport to make sure the

marriage took place properly.

My mother-in-law was predeceased by her husband Charles William known as Bill a victuallar highly respected in Waterford by all sections of the community. He first went to Ireland to introduce the frozen meats and loved it so much he stayed until he died exactly 20 years ago. The Smyth history is that Grandfather Smyth was an old Finian boy and escaped to Liverpool with a price on his head. There are very many Smyth's in Liverpool some who have visited Ireland and others who

who know nothing about it.

Another relation who preceded Mrs. Smyth, was the famous Arthur Ellis, M.B.E. who designed the longest strech of railroad in the world at the time, namely the Mullibar Plain in Australia. His wife was a Smyth so there are plenty of Smyths in Australia and still living in Sydney (Continued on page 14.)

1980 Welfare Report (continued).

In the face of things, Career Guidance for young people must take on a new dimension—not just matching aptitude to work which will be intrinsically rewarding, but developing transferable skills and adaptability in a changing economy and learning to use leisure more

constructively.

Adverts in some Irish provincial papers, offering great promotional prospects and quoting wages around £200 a week, enticed a considerable number of young people to London. Their door to door sale of dubious magazines left them with £30 or less per week. Some held on from week to week hoping they might become financially viable, six left and came to the Centre looking for help. Arrangements were made either to send them home or get them alternative employment. The papers responsible for publishing the adverts were notified.

Of this group, 1066 were in London less than one week and 908 were on their first visit. Many of these got a good start and quickly became independent. Others who did not initially approach the Centre had enough money to book into bed and breakfast on arrival but being unable to secure employment or work the social benefit system, found themselves destitute on the London streets.

Meals or food parcels were provided for 374 people; 170 were given money in varying amounts according to their needs; 190 received pre-

paid bus tickets or travel warrants.

Some Problem Areas.

Much of our work is preventative or of a crisis intervention nature. The most frequent needs are accommodation and work.

Single people of all ages from sixteen upwards, and for whom there is no statutory provision, form a substantial and ever increasing proportion of London's homeless. The acute and growing shortage of housing affects particularly the over thirty age groups. Most hostels have an upper age limit of twenty-five, lettings in the private sector have decreased dramatically and many of those who continue to rent rooms prefer a students intake. The only alternatives are the large lodging houses or Government reception centres which are estimated as having forty to fifty thousand users annually. Anbody coming from Ireland, who wishes to be established in a flat and launched in work, will need at least two hundred pounds.

Conclusion of Youth Report.

Recommendations.

It is recommended to the Federation that the following action be taken.

The appointment by the Federation Officers of a Youth Organiser

who should be an ex-officio Federation Officer.

The appointment of a permanent Sub-Committee on Youth comprising of people who have an interest in Youth and/or experience in Youth work, some young members, and the Youth Organiser. The size of this Sub-Committee shall not exceed ten persons who should be appointed if possible on a regional basis. The function of the Sub-Committee will be as follows:-

7:2:1 To promote and encourage the formation of Youth groups

in affiliated Societies.

7:2:2 To act in an advisory capacity to affiliated Societies in respect on Youth. 7:2:3

To liaise with and encourage contact between Youth Groups. 7:2:4 To investigate the possibility of an organised affiliation of Youth Groups under the auspices of the Federation.

7:2:5 To organise national and regional seminars, conferences and Training opportunities for young people and adults involved with youth to meet, discuss problems, swap ideas, and have fun.

To investigate further the question of identity referred to


in paragraph 4:2 of this report.

7:3 Arrange finance for the Sub-Committee's activities.

7:4 Encourage young members to attend Federation meetings.

We continue to offer tempory accommodation to lads up to the age of twenty-five years, as we still maintain that this is the age-group most in need of our care and concern. The period varies from one to the next, each getting sufficient time to get accustomed to living away from home for the first time, to make an honest effort at sorting out his problems, familiarise himself with the value of money and set his goals for the future. Of course, some lads are, Thank God, sure-footed and know what they are about. They only need a short stay while they go in search of a more permanent type of accommodation in an area convenient to their work. During the four years of existence we have dealt with 228 whose ages are as follows:—

A Happy Christmas Story or Little Miss Courage





failed my examination", and so on from a recent article on 'Hidden Talent' carried by the The Daily Telegraph. This dialogue between teacher requirements and skills of the jobs. During this process much latent talent was discovered, the girls became confident and were eager to return to school to acquire the qualifications and skills for their choice of job. "The class room stragglers became happy, confident young women and found education interesting and exciting", stated their class teacher.

My very sincere congratulations to Sr. De Lourdes and her staff on their courageous and invaluable venture. I wish them every success and sincerely hope that very soon many other schools will experiment with this 'experienced based learning'. There are religions in Ireland at this moment wondering how best they can co-operate with the Irish Chaplaincy Scheme in Britain. I suggest to these dedicated people that they co-operate in the introduction and the implementing of E.B.L. into the big city schools, particulary those in the poor and deprived areas. It is my strong opinion, that this application of learning to everyday life, will rapidly diminish and finally eradicate the 'no good at school' idea. Consequently the future young emigrant will be full of self-confidence and well equipped for his choice of occupation.

On various occasions I have questioned lads as to whether or not, during their Post Primary education they ever heard a talk or discussion on emigration. I am sad to state their replies were always in the negative. I am well aware that Fr. P. J. Byrne and his dedicated team do trojan work by way of advance preparation for intending emigrants, but my main worry is the youngsters who never heard of their work, never read church notices and who suddenly decide to set sail. These people must be helped. How? I have dealt with this serious topic in my previous report but alas! This year I make a special appeal to all the Bishops of Ireland to circularise headmistresses/headmasters and Spiritual Directors, insisting, that at least occasional talks on emigration be given to all classes. Surely every class has as least one who will emigrate. "Every single person . . . is the object of Christ's Redemptive love" (Pope John Paul II). What about The Good Shepherd leaving the 99?

Once again I wish to say a very sincere thank you to many people for their encouragement and support during the past four years—my Superiors, my Community in Midleton, those who helped each year with the sale of tickets for our Annual Bazaar, the members of The Irish Chaplaincy Scheme for their supportive friendship, Fr. B. Gilmore for his ceaseless efforts to 'bind us together' and his constant reminders of our majority priority—Evangelisation, the manager and staff of Charles House for their continued kindness. The lads join with me in thanking Fr. Lawlor and the Bureau staff for the continued co-operation. We congratulate them on the great work accomplished, in and through the Bureau, during the past decade.
