Missing Persons (continued from last month).

Of the twenty-eight reported missing only fourteen were located. The Centre has never taken on the role of an agency for tracing missing people, mainly because of the shortage of personnel and the time consuming nature of this work, nevertheless the happiness and gratitude of all parties when a reunion takes place makes the exercise very worth

Bridget left Ireland for New Zealand fifty years ago, after a rather tough upbringing in a childrens' home. Unsuccessfully over the years she has placed adverts in Irish papers in an attempt to trace her two brothers from whom she had never heard. Three months after her initial contact with us, one brother, now senile, was located; his children were glad to correspond with an aunt who had frequently been the topic of family discussion. The other brother had died.

Why do so many Irish pepole cut themselves off from their roots and remain a lifetime without contacting their families. Many have left their homes because of marital breakdown or a severe drink or gambling problem or a deep rift in family relationships because of property rights, or resentments and anger about some injustice or disagreement which is kept alive by pride. Home is a painful area, never forgotten but better not remembered. Some cut their links and doggedly resist any renewal of contact. Many are ashamed to present themselves at home after years of absence and rough living, though they always hope to return when they get themselves together.

A further difficulty arises when people die in London and relatives cannot be traced. M.R. died in a squat and as police failed to locate relatives, burial in a common grave was imminent. A series of enquiries on the squatting grapevine revealed a few clues. A doctor's name was traced in the telephone directory. There were several families of the name in the area. The Gardai were superb. By a process of elimination the correct family was found, even though they had moved from the area years previously. Within forty eight hours of initiating the enquiry, the body was identified and on the way home for burial.

The Centre has now purchased an 'Irish plot' to provide a Catholic burial place for unidentified people.

#### Introduction by Fr. Brian Lawler.

When are we not going to be able to say that it was a bad year for welfare? When will there be a turn for the better instead of more problems of every kind, as in 1982? The signs don't look good, and so (like all welfare organisations) I can only report sadly a year of evergreater needs, with the statistics showing an unhealthy growth.

This claim or boast that we at least are more and more busily employed is one that we would wish to do without. However, an ever worsening situation is what we must be prepared to cope with for some time to come. Present Government policies seem to take for granted an increase of voluntary organisations while human beings scurry about in all directions trying to make ends meet. For those already fighting for survival before the present economic crisis the outlook is bleak in the extreme.

The Report outlines in general terms some aspects of the work undertaken at the Bureau. It would be unrealistic to expect such a report to give a fuller account of the Bureau's day-to-day activity, since so much of what is done is a matter of human involvement and personal contacts; the sincere and continued concern that goes side-by-side with any material aid given, and often has more lasting value.

In this, my twelfth report, I am more convinced than ever that the Burea is a focal point, often the ONLY one, in the lives of a great number of our callers, irrespective of any tangible help given.




