ANNUAL REPORT 1986

The Annual Report of 1984 and 1985 indicated a new wave of emigration, particularly to London. The Report of 1986 confirms these findings and indicates that the numbers leaving the country are steadily increasing. This has resulted in an upsurge in the numbers of people coming for help to the Centre and has greatly increased the demands on the service to the extent of over-burdening it.

The reduction in the cost of transport had made London even more accessible and attractive. While new arrivals may not believe that the streets are paved with gold, London is still more appealing than an existence of despair 'on the dole' in Ireland.

The majority of callers at the Centre are single and under 25, usually in London for the first time. They generally call within a week of arrival.

Predominately they have no qualifications and have not received any

formal training.

A total of 2,443 new callers were seen at the Centre in 1986, an overand old clients who returned to the Centre after their first visit. This represented a 10% increase in additional interviews.

It is to be remembered that each of these callers it not simply a statistic but an Irish person in distress, seeking accommodation, advice on employment, or perhaps help with obtaining a birth certificate. Some come hoping to get a sympathetic hearing about their problems in trying

to adjust to life in London.

Many did not want to leave Ireland but saw 'London' as their only hope of survival. Ireland's gloomy economy offered them little, except perhaps another training course. London represented the chance to Eat the Peach', i.e. take the risk that it would offer a more attractive lifestyle. Misleading reports reaching Ireland of the possibility of an exciting life for young people, supported by the media, encouraged people to leave. This had the unfortunate effect of discouraging many desperate young people from making forward planning for work and accommodation. The outcome was great disillusionment, hardship and suffering, when they were confronted with the realities of life in London.

Festival.

How to describe the Festival for the Feast of San Miguel (St. Michael The Archangel) is beyond me, but I will try. For a week before the Feast Day there is dancing in the streets and Plazas of Torremolinos, especially called San Miguel, with the beautiful young and old ladies, even babes in arms dressed in gypsy costumes, something to dazzle the eye, one costume more beautiful than the next. As my brother-in-law remarked if they made a ten hour movie of it they would only give you a glimpse of the splendour of it all. There were two processions, one the week previous to the Feast Day and the other one culminating at the Church of San Miguel on the Feast Day. Before the procession commenced there were various services starting with Mass at 12.30 p.m. Later the Blessing of the Coral (The Church of San Miguel is only a few steps away from the sea). Then the beautiful ceremony of the presentation of flowers to San Miguel. Your eyes would play tricks on you with the procession of thousands of children with beautiful bouquets of flowers coming through Calle San Miguel all afternoon and evening until the final procession which took place at 9 p.m. The statue of San Miguel was taken from its normal residing place in the Church and put on a pedestral in the shape of a boat which was bedecked with lovely flowers and lights, it took sixty men to carry the aforementioned, a very tricky job; firstly there are several steps to be negotiated down from the church, at the bottom of the steps in unison the sixty men lower themselves to where you can just see a boat rocking from side to side all decorated in the most fantastic colours and lights with St. Michael The Archangel atop. The processions through the streets were something else with covered wagons drawn by oxen and decorated in flowers, inside were beautiful ladies and gentlemen, also children in their costumes. Behind each wagon were groups of traditional dancers. The first procession, Pilgrimage or 'Romeria' which took place eight days beforehand ended up the hills in the lovely countryside where a fair took place twenty four hours daily for a full week. The stalls, the amusements for young and old, the beautiful gypsy dancing, all on such a vast scale, so spectacular that my pen cannot give it all just description.
