

ST. PATRICK'S PARADE IN DUBLIN 1971

Twenty five members of the Irish County Associations in London represented their particular Associations and The St. Patrick's Parade Committee of London at the big parade in Dublin on March 17th last

Arriving in Dublin on flight 167 Aer Lingus from London at 8 p.m. on March 16th, we were somewhat disappointed in that our coach failed to turn up as arranged and we had a delay of $1\frac{1}{2}$ hours until such time as Aer Lingus very kindly put matters right through C.I.E. The coach in question should have been supplied by a firm in Bray. We arrived at Mount Herbert Hotel, Herbert Street, Ballsbridge, which is convenient to Lansdowne Road R.F.C. grounds. Sandwiches had been arranged through Aer Lingus and Shamrock was supplied by

Bord Failte

As the party was feeling somewhat peckish it was decided to pay a visit to the Inter-continental Hotel which we were told was only around the corner. After a fifteen minutes walk we arrived and it was at this point that Martin Whitty of Wexford used his personality plus approach on two young waitresses who soon provided each of us with a huge T bone steak and the trimmings. This was a most enjoyable outing as the Inter-continental was in a real festive mood for the occasion. We retired just after midnight and awoke on March 17th to a day of glorious sunshine. Breakfast at the Mount Herbert can be had from 7.30 till 9 a.m. At 9 a.m. we attended Mass celebrated by Father McGrath of Wexford and a member of our party in the Chapel of The Marist Brothers College, situated about 50 yards from our hotel.

We lined up at St. Stephens Green as No. 29 on the parade rota and Bord Failte supplied us with an identity banner as hailing from London We carried our National Colours together with the American Flag and the County Banners of Clare, Galway, Mayo, Waterford and Wexford. The St. Patrick's Banner having priority. We were led by the Newry Pipe Band and we received a great welcome from the

onlookers throughout the three mile route.

As we approached the Saluting Base at the G.P.O., the commentator drew attention to the Irish Associations from London making a special mention of the colourful headdress of the two ladies carrying the Clare Banner (Mrs. Moroney and Mrs. Lahiffe). The Parade this year had a terrific American flavour, with fifteen bands from U.S.A. and a party of 2,500 visitors, whom it is said have spent £150,000 in Dublin. It is doubtful if Dubliners ever had a finer free show and they responded all along the three mile route with thunderous applause. With its 50 bands and splendid industrial and cultural exhibits, it was a far cry from other years. A festive atmosphere prevailed from the start with a flyover by the huge Aer Lingus "Jumbo" jet, the St. Columcille. The Minister for Industry and Commerce, Mr. Colley, reviewed the parade from a stand outside the G.P.O. surrounded by hundreds of enthusiastic Americans who had paid £1.25p per ticket. Whooping Red Indians doing a war dance in Dublin's O'Connel Street, marching Connecticut Rebels sporting American War of Independent Uniforms of the control o pendence Uniforms, stepping it out briskly behind a posse of formidable looking Davy Crockett, Wild West Frontiersmen; high stepping drum majorettes in bright costumes dancing to the music of 50 bands with hundreds of American-Irish contingents demonstrating how to celebrate Texas style!

After the parade we were guests of Mr. Tom Gorman for dinner at Jury's Hotel. Many thanks Mr. Gorman for your kindness.




A dance is to be held at the Gresham Ballroom, Archway, N.19, on Sunday, 9th May, in aid of the Association.





THE COLUMBAN FATHERS IN LONDON

In the Ireland of 1916 a "terrible beauty was born" in the final awakening of the nation from the shackles of centuries of domination. What is often forgotten is that side by side, with the well documented cultural and political stirrings of the time, another terrible beauty was born, in a national re-awakening of the Irish Missionary Spirit. This had been dormant for centuries. Now a rash of missionary endeavour was about to break on the Irish scene. First in the field was the "Maynooth Mission to China" — the visionary brain child of Frs. Edward Galvin (Cork), and John Blowick (Mayo). The Chinese Mission was soon to be a household word across the country — due mainly to the popular and widely read magazine "The Far East."

The Maynooth Mission was really its popular title in Ireland. With the spread of the Society to America and Australia — its official title "The Missionary Society of St. Columban" soon took root, and with the passage of years this has been rounded down to "The Columban Fathers." Their appearance on the English scene is something of a latter day happening. It is as if the sweep of its initial westward globe encirclement has come full circle through the States, the Pacific, the Far East and now back to its own door step in Britain.

The Columban Fathers have been active in London circles over the past 15 years. Their House at 30 Ovington Square, S.W.3., has been associated with Irish Emigrant work, in the persons of Frs. Ted McElroy, Cyril Murphy and now Fr. John Casey, since its foundation. The Columban Fathers have also been actively engaged in the Promotion of the Lay Apostolate (and particularly the Legion of Mary). Here the name of Fr. Aidan McGrath immediately springs to mind.

But the primary work of the Columban Fathers has always been, and is, the promotion of their missionary needs, among the Catholics in Britain. This involves a quest for vocations and funds. Fr. Tony O'Dwyer (Galway), is currently involved with the promotion of vocations. On the fund-raising side, Frs. Des Quinn (Mayo), and Joe O'Grady (Sligo), are well-known for their industry and participation in the various social fronts of London. I asked Fr. Quinn what exactly was the nature of his work: "Making the Catholics on the home front mission-minded, aware of their commitment to the 3rd World in the persons of the poor and under privileged people's of the Far East, in


