SHARON SHANNON SINÉAD LOHAN NAIMEE COLEMAN

Described by one reviewer as being "to the accordion what Jimi Hendrix was to the guitar", Sharon Shannon has an international reputation for taking traditional Irish music to new destinations. Her innovative music fuses fast moving accordion with Cajun, Scottish and even reggae influences, to produce some of the most infectiously innovative music ever to come out of Ireland. Her new album Each Little Thing, which features a collaboration with Kirsty MacColl, is due for release at the beginning of April, so her performance during From The Heart will be the first chance to catch new tunes from this exceptionally talented artist.

Joining Sharon on stage tonight will be two of Ireland's hottest new talents. Singer songwriter Sinéad Lohan has been described by Q Magazine as "a natural who needs only an acoustic guitar to...perform minor miracles". A debut album, Who Do You Think I Am, earned universal acclaim and included the song Sailing By, later chosen as the first single from the hugely successful compilation album A Woman's Heart 2.

Still only 19 years old, 1997 promises to be Naimee Coleman's year. Just announced as Best Newcomer and Best Female Artist in this year's prestigious Hot Press Awards, her debut album *Silver Wrists* (already huge in Ireland) will be released in the UK in March. A singer songwriter to watch for in the future, make sure you're amongst those to catch her first major London date



MAIRE BREATNACH

On fiddle, viola, whistles, piano and keyboards Maire has performed and recorded with Christy Moore, Sinéad O'Connor, Donovan, Mike Oldfield, Dolores Keane, Sharon Shannon and Liam O'Maonlai. The original fiddle soloist in *Riverdance - The Show* she has also worked extensively in film and ty, and is featured on soundtracks to *In The Name Of The Father, Rob Roy, Moondance* and *Glenros*. An exciting meeting of traditional music and mythology.

THE BUMBLEBEES

Buzzing around the foyers and Guinness Festival Bar throughout From The Heart, The Bumblebees are Mary Shannon on banjo, mandolin and fiddle, Collette O'Leary on piano accordion and Laoise Kelly on harp. Formed in Galway in 1996, they recently guested on a recording featuring The Chieftains and Joe Cocker. If you like what you hear, then make sure you pick up a copy of their eponymous debut album, released in March this year, and on sale in the foyer.

TAMALIN

Originally from Belfast Tamalin's sound is something utterly unique in the ever broadening field of traditionally based Irish music. Tamalin's music was recently described in the Irish Times as, "sensual, dark, and intoxicating... yet as light on the ear as anything on mainstream pop radio".

BRENDAN POWER

One of the hottest harmonica players around, Brendan is equally at ease on both the earthy blues harp and the sophisticated chromatic harmonica, using his own custom tunings to breathe new life into an instrument often typecast as tiredly traditional. His recent album New Irish Harmonica won critical acclaim for its fresh approach, and featured in Folk Roots' Top Ten of 1994. As well as performing solo, Brendan is a regular session musician, recording with artists like Sting, Ray Charles, Micheál Ó Súilleabháin, Altan, Sharon Shannon, Arty McGlynn and Nollaig Casey.

FOUR MEN AND A DOG

The more you delve into how we came to be who and what we are today, the more complicated it gets," Gino Lupari. One of the biggest new bands to come out of Ireland in recent years, the Four Men's fourth album Long Roads darts between country, bluegrass, salsa and blues yet somehow manages never to stray too far from its trademark scorching fiddle and banjo sound. One of the liveliest bands on the circuit, this lot will get you rockin' and reelin' and probably drive their biggest fans Barking Mad!

NOMOS

At the core of this young dynamic Cork band is the amazing concertina virtuosity of Niall Vallely and the fresh fiddle playing of Vince Milne. The engine room of the group is driven by the brilliant bodhrán playing of Frank Torpey, accompanied by Gerry McKee on mando-cello and John Spillane, the band's excellent singer-songwriter, on bass. Totally infectious and bewitchinga new tradition in Irish music.

JOHN SPILLANE

One of Ireland's favourite singer-songwriters, John has played a central role in two of the hottest releases to come out of Ireland recently - the first being Nomos' debut album I Won't be Afraid Anymore, and the second the Hummingbird compilation album Irishtown. A songwriter who journeys from rock to blues to jazz and back to Irish traditional music for influences, John has been playing with Nomos for three years. Playing solo in the foyer, John will be performing tracks from his soon to be released debut solo album.

ROARATORIO: AN IRISH CIRCUS ON FINNEGAN'S WAKE University College, Cork

Roaratorio, a composition for magnetic tape by composer John Cage, translates Joyce's 628 page novel Finnegan's Wake into a thick, joyous collage of sounds, music and reading, turning it into - as the subtitle explains - An Irish Circus on Finnegan's Wake. St. Giles' Cripplegate will be transformed into Cage's aural representation of Joyce's Ireland. Through use of surround sound techniques the textures, sounds and atmosphere used to capture this classic piece of literature will absorb and overwhelm the senses.

Preceding the performance of this, one of Cage's best loved works, a selection of his other works will be interpreted for the first time by traditional Irish musicians from University College, Cork, on fiddles, flutes, accordion, concertina, harp and bodhrán in a circus of new sounds which is itself an Irish celebration of John Cage.

After the performance in St Giles', there will be a 'session' at the Guinness Bar at which the traditional music that is so much a part of the beauty of Roaratorio will be heard.



period of growth and creativity, and directors and stars such as Neil Jordan, Liam Neeson, Stephen Rea, Jim Sheridan and Gabriel Byrne are now some of the hottest names on the international film scene. *Green on the Screen* celebrates the success of cinema in Ireland within three strands: New Irish Cinema, Irish Film Classics and Irish Music and Film.

The Festival commences on Thursday 3 April with a special gala presentation of David Keating's Last of the High Kings, which proved a huge success with Irish audiences on its recent release. Highlights of the season include special preview screenings of the forthcoming Irish films Joe My Friend, Gold in the Streets. The Eliminator, The Uncle Jack and Snakes and Ladders, whilst the Festival as a whole is showcased by Cathal Black's beautifully crafted film Korea. Irish Destiny, the 1925 lost silent masterpiece now magnificently restored, plays in Cinema 1 on Saturday 12 April accompanied by a live performance by the Irish Chamber Orchestra conducted by Micheal Ó Súilleabháin and Bringing It All Back Home, Philip King's seminal series about the history of Irish rock music, features on 5, 6 and 12 April (see p16). Finally, Irish Cinema: Ourselves Alone, Kevin Rocket's and Donald Taylor Black's acclaimed documentary exploring the history of Irish film (made in celebration of the Centenary of Cinema) will screen in the cinema fover prior to each performance.


