And as for horse racing, the BBC's coverage has to fight for airtime with all the thrills and spills of indoor bowls.



#### Serving the Irish community in London

The Foundation was formed in 1988 by a group of concerned Irish men and women wishing to meet the needs of the large number of young Irish people arriving in London at that time. The group identified a slot in the existing community care provision where a one-stop facility would be of benefit to new arrivals.

Since its inauguration, the Safe Start Foundation has assisted in excess of 20,000 clients. It is now recognised as a major player in the provision of effective support to those in need.

Service provision includes advice on, and access to, accommodation, employment and training.

The EU, central and local government, the Irish government, the Ireland Fund, the Irish Youth Foundation, numerous charities and trusts, Allied Irish Bank, Bank of Ireland, and the Irish business sector, provide funding for the project.

The organisation is looking forward to relocating back to Cricklewood in December 1998, where, in association with the Borough of Barnet and the Network Housing Association, Safe Start will manage the new Foyer Project. This is an exciting development for the Foundation, allowing all of its services to be delivered under the same roof. In addition to providing 24 bed-spaces on site, the new premises will include training facilities in computer literacy, employment-seeking and life skills.

The Foundation has been invited to become a lead agency with Employment Service and North London TEC for the government's New Deal programme.

The trustees and management are aware that many of the Foundation's backers are present at tonight's function and therefore wish to offer sincere thanks for their continued support.

The Foundation would be pleased to hear from anyone wishing to become involved in its valuable and rewarding work.

#### The Irish Post Awards

#### A celebration of achievement

This is the twenty-second year of The Irish Post Awards. The awards were conceived in the midseventies. Their purpose was and remains to applaud personal achievement which redounds to the credit of the Irish community in Britain and also to highlight community service by Irish people and organisations. The awards are, of course, a means of celebration, a toast to the concept of being Irish abroad. Over the years, they have reflected the diversity of the Irish contribution to British society in so many areas of life. The success and esteem of the awards can be measured in the many distinguished figures who have agreed to accept them.

Among the famous names who have been recipients are Daniel Day-Lewis, Fiona Shaw, Kenneth Branagh, Sinead Cusack, Michael Gambon, Stephen Rea, Dame Ninette de Valois and Ralph Fiennes in the performing arts. There have been figures too from other areas of entertainment — Desmond Lynam, Terry Wogan, Bob Geldof, Mary O'Hara, Ardal O'Hanlon and the directors Declan Donnellan and Danny Boyle. Among the writers honoured have been William Trevor, Edna O'Brien, Jerry O'Neill and Donall MacAmhlaigh. Honoured too have been a number of academics who have distinguished themselves in very different fields: Professor Anthony Clare, Professor James O'Connell,

Professor Mike Cooley and Professor Roy Foster.

The majority of the awards, however, have gone to


individuals and organisations who have provided highly valued community service and whose activities

A detail of tonight's awards made from bronze and Kilkenny limestone.




Our awards this evening were designed by the Irish sculptor Pat Dolan, who has a studio in Kinsale and trained as a silversmith and sculptor with Franz Neuner in Barcelona. The studio boasts of two public monuments and work in the collection of three presidents, one cardinal, numerous bishops and even a pope.

The bronze awards this evening portray The Flight of The Wild Geese. After the Battle of Kinsale in 1601, the defeated Gaelic Earls of Ulster left Ireland for Continental Europe. Their departure is known as The Flight of the Wild

Geese, probably because the bill of loading and manifesto of the ships that carried them abroad declared them as wild geese so as to avoid detection. Another outflow of Irish followed the Treaty of Limerick, these were also known as Wild Geese.

Many of these emigrants excelled in their new





Continental lives, finding diverse careers in such as the French and Spanish armed forces and viniculture. Indeed many of the Burgundy and Bordeaux fine wines still bear names such as Lynch, McCarthy and Barton. Since their flight, the Wild Geese have emerged as symbols of the Irish diaspora.

Champion fund-raisers Eileen Wagstaff and Denis Neenan were both worthy award recipients, individually recognised for their tireless support of numerous charitable causes.








Kilkenny man Seamus McGarry proudly displays his Irish Post Award surrounded by some of his colleagues from the Safe Start Foundation.

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
