FIFTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT

For the year ending 31st Dec.1969.

The year 1969 commenced with the official opening of The Douglas Hyde Lounge. This was performed by His Excellency The Irish Ambassador, Mr. John Molloy, and the Lounge was blessed by His Lordship Bishop Patrick Casey V.G. The new Lounge has meant an increase in the activities on the social side of our establishment, which have been no less than 'feverish'in consequence. The continued success of this social project for which we pay tribute to all concerned - is very encouraging. While fulfilling a very definite need in it's own right, and also in accordance with the terms of our Constitution to provide amenities for social recreation - this wonderful work is enabling us to carry out in a better manner, the primary end of all our efforts, namely our Welfare work.

In our Fourteenth Annual Report (Dec. 1968), it is recorded that our Hostel at 51/52 Camden Square would have to be "-improved, remodelled or rebuilt". 1969 has been a year of very close negotiations with the owners of the property adjacent to our present site, with a view to acquiring the property for a new Hostel. Our hopes are high of bringing these negotiations to a fruitful conclusion.

II. SUMMARY OF WELFARE REPORT

The Welfare Office interviewed 2,299 applicants in 1969. The total number of "Items of service rendered" was 3,535 as against 4,906 in 1968. The following is a break-down of the figures:-

⁽¹⁾ The most notable feature from the Welfare Report was the fact that 11% of the 'first-time emigrants' coming to our Office

were under 18. The age-bracket of this 11% tended to be fourteen, fifteen and sixteen years of age.

- (ii) There was a 7% increase over last year in the number of women over 21 arriving in London for the second or third time.
- (iii) The number of men over 45 (returning) increased by 7%.
- (iv) A total of 13% of those interviewed continued to return at regular intervals to the Welfare Department.
- (v) 9 Families arriving for the first time sought assistance.
- (vi) Compared to 1968 the number of 'lst-time mentally ill' arrivals was down. However an increase was noted in 'return visits' of women suffering from mental illness.

IV. FINANCE

The Accounts show that our liabilities have decreased by £9,931 to £57,575 whilst our fixed assets have decreased by £1,146 to £112,600.

It should be pointed out that 'fixed assets' represent capital expenditure to date, less depreciation, and bear no relation to the aggregate current market value of our properties.

In reviewing the reliability of our sources of revenue it will be noted that the total received during the year from covenants, collections and donations exceeded the overall deficit in revenue by £10,328.
