Leeds Irish Health and Homes launch their new website on August 1st 2003. The launch comes at a time when the number of referrals to Irish Health and Homes is increasing significantly.

In the last year alone we have received over 4553 calls to our

service. The majority of these calls are from current clients but many are from agencies, both statutory and voluntary and individuals enquiring about the services we run.

Anna Dunne, Communications Officer highlighted:

"Although our core services revolve around housing and outreach services we have many other groups, advice services and reports that people can access. We are hoping that this website will be a new communication tool for the Irish community in Leeds, providing an initial point for people who need information straight away about all of our services.

We are particularly pleased with the development of this website as we were unable to secure any funding towards its implementation. We have drawn from expertise within the organisation to push this project forward.

We will be adding lots of new pages as the website develops over the next year. I would encourage people to log on and check it out. I am sure they will be surprised at how vast our services actually are.

We would also like to encourage as many other organisations as possible to offer a reciprocal link to their websites so we can make getting information off the web as accessible as possible to those that need it most."

Leeds Irish Community Forum

On May 1st 2003 the Leeds Irish Community Forum was re-launched at the O'Meara Suite, Leeds Irish Centre. Leeds Irish Health and Homes began to develop this Forum last year but due to funding issues the meetings had come to a halt.

We were delighted to receive funding from Leeds Voice Community Chest to administer the meetings this year and the re-launch was a successful and interesting evening.

Ant Hanlon, Director of Leeds Irish Health and Homes led the first meeting. It is hoped however that in time other attendees will lead the meetings. It is a key aim of the Forum that it is an open floor for all Irish groups and individuals to comment on issues affecting themselves and their community. Key highlights from Ant's speech that night are as follows.

Leeds Irish Community Forum is about

- Inclusion:
- Representation;
- Development;
- Expanding on good things; and
- Re-addressing the lack of participation of the Irish community in community issues.

At previous meetings we established that:

- LICF is a forum not a committee
- LIHH will administer but not run LICF.
 We hope to see rotating chairs
- That attendees of the Group have a responsibility to make it work

Since the last meeting we have been:

Talking to interested parties outside the

- Irish community e.g. Councillors to harness support;
- Secured a funding bid of £3000;
- Commissioned a photo exhibition of the Irish community by Corinne Nicholson. The exhibition is a community exhibit and can be used by other Irish groups.
- Developed the Older People's Forum which is a partnership of YIEF, the Tuesday Club, the Irish Centre & LIHH. They have met John Battle MP to discuss funding to develop services for older Irish people.
- Supported the Returning to Ireland seminar organised by The Safe Home Programme based in Mulranney. The people who came found it informative. The stark reality is there is not a lot of choice for people wanting to return to live in Ireland if they are not economically viable. This puts more onus on developing support services in the UK.
- LIHH have written a joint funding application to Dion for a club development worker on behalf LIHH & the Tuesday Club at Leeds Irish Centre.

It was suggested at the meeting that a co-ordinated directory of services/groups should be developed for and by the Irish community, providing easy access to essential addresses and numbers for Irish groups/important individuals in the community.

The next meeting is on Thursday 31st July at 8pm in the O'Meara Suite, Leeds Irish Centre. If you are interestd in attending please send your contact details to:

funding has come from a successful bid to Leeds Voice Community Chest.



SPOTLIGHT ON LEEDS IRISH HEALTH AND HOMES HOUSING SERVICE

Introduction

One of LIHH's key services is that of supported housing. We gain tenancies from housing providers, such as Leeds City Council which we then furnish and decorate and manage on behalf of the housing providers. Our support is offered to people who have housing and/or health needs and who benefit from support. Our aim is to ensure that people can maintain their independence in their own homes.

You can be referred to our organisation by:

- vourself:
- your doctor;
- a relation:
- a friend; or a
- a social worker.

We are happy for you to come into the office but it would be best if you call to make an appointment so we can ensure that there is someone with housing advice experience available to speak to you.

What happens at the appointment?

The appointment will be an informal chat about your current housing situation and a chance to assess the level of support that you require. We

will talk about the type of housing you would like and the area you would prefer to live in. We can't promise to re-house in the area

that you request but we can let you know if we have any housing available and how long the waiting list will be.

How long will I have to wait?

This will depend upon your current situation. There is a waiting list for our accommodation as we only have a limited number of properties but your wait will depend on a number of things.

- The severity of your current housing situation.
- The availability of housing in an area compatible to your request.
- The current waiting list for that area.
- Our capacity to secure properties.

Presently we have 72 units of housing which are all filled. If we cannot offer you housing at the present time we can certainly point you in the right direction of other agencies who can help.

How do I furnish the flat?

We will furnish and decorate the flat for you but it is a condition of your tenancy that it is kept up to a clean standard. You will be provided with a bed, sofa, TV, cutlery etc.

How do I pay my rent?

If you are receiving benefits, most, if not all of you rent will be paid by your housing benefit. We will let you know if you will have to pay any additional amounts. As with any other accommodation you will be responsible for paying for your gas, electric, water and living expenses.

Are there any other things I should know about?

When you accept your tenancy it is a condition of the Tenancy Agreement that you receive support from our organisation. This will include regular visits from our Housing Support Workers. They can help you with a variety of issues such as:

- Organising hospital appointments,
- Practical support such as form-filling, connection to gas/electricity,
- Advice about the types of benefits you are entitled to,
- Support in accessing other support services, and
- Help in organising repairs to your tenancy.

How long does this support last?

We support you for as long as you feel you need it. As you become more independent you may not require as much support. You then have the option of becoming the tenant of the housing association or council who we manage the accommodation for.

What if I have my own accommodation but would like some help or advice from an Irish organisation?

You are welcome to access our other outreach services. We currently have an Elders Outreach Worker who can visit over 55's in their home and advise on pension and home adaptations for example. We also have a Health Outreach Worker who can help people who may have a mental or physical health difficulty. Again he can visit you in your own home to provide advice and support.
