# A WORD FROM THE CHAIR OF LEEDS IRISH CENTRE

Leeds Irish Centre, surely one of the finest Irish Centres in the land. I have frequented the Club, as I call it, since my teenage years and probably take it for granted. Other places I used to frequent over the years have come and gone, but the Club has stood the test of time. But take it for granted we must not. In a world that is constantly changing we must keep up with the times and trends and this the club has done well.

One of the main reasons for success, I believe, is the community of front line staff. One has been there since the place opened; others shortly after, so when you visit the Club at any time of the day or night a friendly

face is always there to have the craic and beer with. The Club also hires many part time staff due to its diversity of functions, and soon they too inherit the friendly Irish ways, a credit to their selector and mentors.

As I said in my address to the members at this year's Annual General Meeting, I think we have reached one of those

major transition periods now. It has always been the case that if you do not continually change to match or exceed the performance of your competitors then you face extinction. I think now the pressure for change has reached unprecedented levels. One of the main reasons for this is the speed of change in technology and the continuing success of the Irish economy. This is a totally new experience we have to deal with as a Management Committee. We have seen other Centres get into difficulty and some close, but with good forward planning and from our position of strength, I see a bright future for our Club providing we do not let sentiment dull our vision and we have the courage to tackle it.

As a management team, we are aware of this. We accept and understand that change will not occur naturally by itself, but has to be managed and I am sure this shall be dealt with efficiently and affectively.

The Club deals with every celebration from the cradle to the grave, whether it is the christening of a new born baby, to the celebration of a life Events can be so diverse that on iust ended. rare occasions some decisions have to be made on the hoof at very short notice by the senior staff, which can be very difficult and can affect other planned venues. This, if not dealt with professionally and sensitively, can result in a lot of distress and cause negative

> conversation. Our staffs deal with this type of situation effectively 99% of the time which no one hears about.

I am a great believer in staff development, as this keeps your staff on a level playing field with your competitors. The Management Committee and staff are committed to providing a high standard of service to our members and their



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

# WEBSITE SUCCESS—www.lihh.org beats anticipated number of hits



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# DAVITT HOUSE TRUST SEEKS SUPPORT FROM LEEDS IRISH HEALTH & HOMES

As people may be aware, there have been changes occurring at Davitt House recently. Davitt House is a small residential unit in Headingley for 6 older Irish people offering an alternative to isolation and loneliness. Staffed by a resident House Manager, Richard Conway, it is now in its 10<sup>th</sup> year of providing an excellent service to its residents.



Since 1999, the Government, Local Authorities and Housing Agencies have been working towards a change in the way that supported housing services are delivered. This new legislation known as 'Supporting People' has had wide-reaching implications for resources such as Davitt House as it brings with it stringent rules and regulations which if not adhered to could threaten its continued existence. Organisation's such as LIHH, which have dedicated staff working in this field are being taxed by its demands, but agencies such as the Davitt House Trust would have found it impossible to operate within its existing resources.

Its Directors therefore took the decision to ask LIHH if they would manage it on their behalf to ensure that Davitt House continued its valued service. Ant Hanlon, Director of LIHH highlighted, "The Irish community in Leeds were very involved in the setting up of Davitt House as they recognised too many of their older members were in isolated positions without regular contact. This valuable resource has been kept going through the dedication and tireless efforts of its current Directors and Richard Conway, but we know that it could not have continued in its present state for much longer". The fear was that if the Trust and LIHH had not acted quickly, the service could have been put out to tender and this could have meant an organisation taking over which was not particularly sensitive to the cultural needs of Irish people.

In fully endorsing this statement the Directors of Davitt House Trust recognise the difficulties inherent in changes like this; misinformation and rumour which abound, but we are all determined to ensure continuation of service to those people that need it. Our plans are to consult with the current and future residents to ensure the longevity of this important resource and secure it as a place where members of the Irish community would want members of their family to go for security and stability as they get older.

We hope to make this holiday a yearly occurrence. This year the individual's in the group contributed to the holiday and we hope we can give some more clients a holiday to look forward to for next year.








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## LIHH TENANT VOLUNTEERS AT ST VINCENT 'S SUPPORT CENTRE

Leeds Irish Health & Homes tenant Albert has been volunteering at St Vincent Support Centre for almost two months, and thoroughly enjoys the challenges and variety that each day brings.

St Vincent's, on York Road near Great Clothes, is a charity. Under the one roof you can find an excellent charity store, a community café, a free counselling service, and a free debt advice and debt counselling service. October 2003 sees the launch of an Education Centre which will offer free and informal education taster sessions, which they hope will give local people the confidence to access more formal college courses. There will also be a resource room, which will be filled with information about a variety of subjects, including volunteering, training, job opportunities, health, local agencies and support groups.

You can find Albert in the café, serving up tea, coffee and snacks to the customers. A retired chef, Albert enjoys putting his skills to good use at the Centre, and putting something back into the community.

We are always on the look out for volunteers - in fact we are quite desperate for them at the moment! We require people to work in our shop and cafe - no particular skills or experience required - just a friendly disposition and reliability.

We also welcome donations of good quality items, such as clothing, bric-a-brac, electrical items, and small items of furniture which we can sell in our shop. We can usually collect if people cannot deliver to us.

Finally, financial donations, however small, help us continue our good work in helping disadvantaged and marginalised people in Leeds.

They want to remind people not to be bullied into agreeing to work on the spot and not to give any money up front, not even for materials!

If you don't think the job needs doing or think the price is too high call First Check Point on 0870 013 27 27. Calls are charged at National Rates and the help line is open between 9.00am to 4.30pm Monday— Friday.

First Check Point works in partnership with Age Concern, Leeds City Council, West Yorkshire Police, Yorkshire Television, Help the Aged, Neighbourhoods Watch and other local voluntary groups.

# DIRECTOR'S REPORT: CARE, CULTURE & COMMUNITY: SUPPORTING PEOPLE

This year has seen final preparations being set in place for the biggest change to the supported housing sector for many years through the 'Supporting People' programme. Much of our focus this year has involved ensuring that our future stability has been secured both in financial terms and in the **CARE** and support we can offer to our tenants.

The constraints of the new programme have put pressure on smaller groups. Davitt House, a 6-bed residential unit for older Irish people, has now come under our management after members of the Davitt House Trust approached us realising they were no longer in a position to guarantee the longer-term welfare of its residents or the scheme itself. This next year will see the project having to make the necessary changes to be brought in line with the 'Supporting People' requirements.

I believe that LIHH are now prepared to embrace the opportunities that 'Supporting People' presents in order ensure our tenants maintain the levels of independence they require.

Our Outreach services have had 3-year funding secured which gives us a chance to develop a long-term focus to our work. The need for services sensitive to the **CULTURE** of Irish people continues to grow with new referrals constantly coming in. As an Irish organisation, trust in the services we provide is paramount; over half of our referrals come from people approaching us themselves or via a friend or relative. We recognise that culturally we are the same as the people we provide services to, but there is a deeper culture within LIHH which respects individuals for who they are and the experiences that have brought them to need our service. We welcome diversity in people and try to respond to people in a way that we would wish to be responded to. Our aim for the future is to ensure that ethos is maintained.

Our report 'Diggin Deeper' which was launched in October highlighted the lack of services targeted at the Irish community. LIHH recognises the need for choice for Irish people; as yet there is very little of this in support services. This year, in an effort to support a stronger Irish voice within the City's debates, we have developed the Irish **COMMUNITY** Forum which aims to bring interested members together to drive forward our participation in many of the areas where the Irish do not currently have a voice.

## INTRODUCING.....

New funding has been gained to develop our Community Outreach services. We have now

recruited 2 new workers who will be commencing work in November. We would also like to welcome Gerry Gallagher who has joined us a new Housing Support Worker.

#### COMMUNITY OUTREACH WORKER

This post has been filled by Eileen Igoe. Eileen's key purpose is to help to develop and provide culturally sensitive services for the benefit of the vulnerable Irish people in Leeds, particularly with regards to the provision of day care services for older Irish people in Leeds. An important part of her role will be to link up with the Tuesday Club at the Irish Centre to discuss long-term development plans.

Eileen's responsibilities will include:

- Consulting vulnerable Irish people to identify support needs they may have, preferences and service requirements;
- To establish contact with isolated Irish people not accessing community services;
- To work in partnership with other Irish voluntary agencies in Leeds, such as the Tuesday Club, to develop the capacity of existing services; and
- To produce evidence-based reports and statistics which can then be used to raise awareness of the needs of vulnerable and isolated Irish people and promote culturally sensitive practice amongst other statutory and voluntary agencies.

#### COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT WORKER

This post has been filled by Eddie Mulligan. Eddie's key responsibility is to develop sustainable initiatives in order to improve the public health of the Irish community in East Leeds. Also to raise awareness of the needs of the Irish community in terms of health inequalities and ensure the community's participation in the regeneration of their neighbourhood.

Eddie's responsibilities will include:

- Facilitating consultation with members of the Irish community in order to identify their concerns, aspirations and needs in terms of public health, community development and regeneration;
- To produce evidence based reports and and statistics for the East Leeds Primary Care Trust;
- To work with East Leeds PCT in identification of areas of disadvantage within the irish community;
- To develop dialogue with newly formed and embryonic groups who engage with members of the Irish community; and
- To enable groups within the Irish community to capacity build through the provision of advice, support and information.


been our host team last year. We won by 2 points but were put under severe pressure from Grange and it was a credit to all the lads to hold out.
