
Irish women's



newsletter

Since our last newsletter before the summer, work of refurbishing our premises has taken place: the work taking longer than originally scheduled by the builders but now almost complete. Because we've not had enough funds to decorate the building inside (costs of labour alone estimated at £5,000 and taking roughly 5 weeks), WEBB Builders, a women's training centre in West London have offered their trainees to do this work. This is of untold help to us. They will begin work as soon as possible. However, the 3 workers will move in on 29th November while painting is still in progress.

Our opening day is set for the 1st February, 1986 - Brigid's Day (Celtic Goddess)
There will be more about this later but we will have an afternoon of music, dancing, singing, food, videos, and generally a day of celebration. So keep your diaries open for that Sat.

The second Irish Women's Conference to be held in London took place on Sept. 21st. More than 300 women attended. Dorothy Fergus from The London Irish Women's Centre opened the conference by tracing the progress, developments and setbacks Irish women have had in the past year. Maire O Shea spoke about her experience living in this country for the past 30 years. Margaret O Neill about her horrific experience of the PTA. The remainder of the day consisted of discussion groups on variety of topics of concern to us. Charabanc, the Belfast Women's Theatre Group gave us of their rich talents during lunch. In the evening the Hairy Mary's, an Irish women's dance troupe, gave up a wonderful performance including a sketch about Britain's role in Ireland. Many women sang and the rest of the evening we danced to the music. A report from the conference will be soon available with papers, workshop reports etc.

In the meantime we have 700 books available to hire from our library and are in the process of cataloguing these. After the 1st Dec. it will be possible for women to borrow books and a list will be available at the centre. OUR NEW PHONE NUMBER WILL BE 249 7318. 

The government is currently reviewing the social security system. The new proposals, presently at the stage of a grenn paper called "The Reform of Social security", or more commomly known as the Fowler reviews, have very serious implications for women and people from ethnic minorities. The proposed changes will make life much harder for the vast majority of people who receive any state benefits and will almost certainitly effect everyone at some stage in their life. As it is the present social security system is far from adequate to deal with the growing number of people who use it. The government has ahs forbidden any increased spending and has ruled out any improvements, infact the proposed changes will actually reduce most peoples benefits or reduce their rights to them. Since 1979 alone it is really easy to see the evidnce that the government has redistributed at least £2 billion from the poor to the rich in the form of cuts in benefits and cuts in taxation for the rich.

The main ways that these proposals, if they become law will effects the lives of women are briefly set out below:-

- 1) Child benefit. The present rate of child benefit has fallen well behind the rising cost of living. Their will be no significant increase in the rate paid to bring it up to a realistic level.
- 2) Family Income Supplement. The government intends to replace the current F.I.S. with a Family Creit sceheme. This money will not be paid by Giro but by employers through the wage packet. What it will ineffect constitute is state subsidised low pay. Family credit will be calculated on the net earnings from the evidence of the last 13 wage slips, (at present it is only 5). The result of this will be that if a family comes to England and does manage to find part- time work they will not be entitled to claim any 'top-up' money for the first 13 weeks. Also these apyments, when finally made will be subject to six monthly reviews. Full-time work will be taken as 24 hours a week instaed of 30hrs. Probably the worst effect these changes will have on mothers of two parent families is that because the benefits will be paid through tax relief it will be most likely be paid to the man. The vast majority of people support the way that F.I.S. is paid at present form i.e. usually to the woman through a giro. These changes will reduce a woman's finacial freedom wothin the family and probably most women will not see the half of it. The government does not make any proposals as to how the money will be paid during wage disputes when there si no wage packet. At present only half of those people who are entitled to F.I.S. claim it. Without any doubt the take up of family credit will be even less. The way the money will be paid is very complicated. A person has to apply to the D.H.S.S for the benefit but

it is paid by tax relief and will be the responsibility of an employer. This will almost definately reduce the take up rate even further as people will have to disclose details of their personal circumstances to their employer. Also smaller employers will probably be reluctant to take on the extra paper work this will involve. How the self employed will get family credit is yet unclear. Who knows what will happen if someone tries to changes their job within the six months and what the proceedure is for people who have more then one part-time job no one knows! At present F.I.S. is an automatic passport to free school meals and welfare foods, i.e. anyone who is entitled to F.I.S. is automatically entitled to free school meals for their children, however it will now only be people on Supplimentary benefit who will get them. 3) Maternity benefits. The present maternity grant is going to be abolished. Instead a grant will be paid out of the new social fund. This will be a pool of money that will be used for all maternity grants and all 'one off' payments. This will be a limited amount of money which once it has been allocated cannot and the fund is empty then no more requests will be granted. In other words don't move or have a baby at the end of the financial year because the chances are there will be no money left in the fund for you. At present it has only been said that women on family credit will be entitled to the grant, who else will be entitled no-one knows, this grant is also going to be means tested so many women who need the money won't get it. Also an important group thta will not be eligable for the grant is girls under sixteen who are not entitled to income support or family credit.

- 4) One-Off payments. At present you can get a 'one-off' lump sum payment to cover numerous things e.g. moving, setting up your first home. These payments as it is are very small and not really sufficient to the cover the cost of the ditems. However the new proposals will get rid of these payments altogether and replace them with a system of discretionary grants or loans. These will be allocated out of these cial fund mentioned above and will be paid back by weekly deductions from your benefit. It is people with disabilities that these discretionary loans will probably hit the hardest. The government intends to do away with the weekly additions that people are entitled to to bolster their income e.g. special heating allowance, special diet allowance, mobility allowance. People with disabilities will also be effected in terms of their pension as they often have a history of sickness and so may find it difficult to secure a private pension.
- 5) The Death Grant: The current extremely inadequate death grant is going to be replaced by provision, (yes you've guessed it) the social fund. This loan will only be paid to people who are assessed, rather arbitarily as not being able to meet "reasonable" funeral costs. When the money is given the state will have powers to recover the money form the estate of the deceased or from

the claiment herself. The Green paper states "responsibility will area clearly on the individual and on the family to save and insure for this continuency".

Retirement. The green paper proposes to do away with SERPS, (state earnings related pensions). Everyone will be required to contribute to an occapational or private pension. The minium contributions are to be 4% of saturngs with employers meeting at least half. This will particuarly effect people who have been outside the British labour market until very late in their working careers. Immigrants to Britain and women who have been bringing up children will got a particularly raw deal. These proposals, if they become law will force many more old people onto inadequate means tested benefit. It is quite clear that the people the government want to hit the hardest are women and pensioners from ethnic minorities. As mentioned earlier with the phas ng otu of additional benefits, e.g. heating, and the abolition of help with water rates, pensioners will be hit very hard by these proposals. 7) Housing benefit. The government has announced cuts of £500 million in housing benefits. It is estimated that at least } of all households will love some benefit. Many of these will be pensioners. Everyone, even those on the so called poverty line' will have to pay at least 20% of their tales. Rests will still be paid but though households will receive 100% help with their rent they will only receive help with 80% of their rates. The new regualitions related to boarders has had a lot of publicity and has tempoarily been made illegal, however when the government irons out a few legalities it will be reintroduced again. This rule puts a restriction on the length of time that single homeless under the age of 26 cars remain in bed and breakfast for a restricted length of time. This varies depending depending on where you live, i.e. if you live in London you have to move on to a new 'discrict' after 8 weeks, if you live on the coast you will have to move on after 2 weeks or forfeit your benefit. There are also remours that thye are going to introduce a limit on how long someone would have to have been in the country for before they are entitled to sign on, though no definate limits have been stated. Already young firsh people have been offered their fare home when they have gone to sign on at the D.H.S.S. At present the propsed legislation is at the stage of green paper. A white

Legislation is expected later this year with the aim of bringing in the new structure in April 1987. The proposed cuts will effect everyone right across the board. I'm glad you have that choice. What about Irish disabled women Living in England - presumably that's not important or an issue. How dare you presume from your privledged position as able-bodied women, to believe that women with disabilities do not merit political thought or energy. As Irish women with disabilities, we are ashamed of the lack of solidarity by our so-called Irish sisters here today. **

COUNSELLING CENTRES IN DUBLIN THREATENED......

The only two organisations in Ireland who offer unbiased pregnancy counselling in Ireland are being threatened with closure. The Well Woman Centre (tel dublin 789511) and Open Line Counselling (tel dublin 787160) are being taken to court charged with 'offending the Irish constitution' and 'conspiring to corrupt public morals'.

The well woman centre offers a comprehensive service on all aspects of women's health. In 1984 they were used by 70,502 people. About 800 of these people received unbiased pregnincy counselling.

Open Line counselling offers a service which specialises in helping women who are pregnant.

The action against these two organisations is a direct follow on from the constitutional amendment of September 1983 which made abortion in Ireland illegal under any circumstances. This gave a lot of power and encouragement to dangerous right ring elements within Irish society. These people went so far as to pose as clients with unwanted pregnancy. They were offered non judgemental counselling in good faith by both the Well Woman Centre and Open Line Counselling. Now the counsellors are being taken to court! It is estimated that about 10,000 women per year come to England from Ireland for abortions. The need for abortion has always existed and will not go away. Until the Well Woman Centre and Open Line offered unbiased counselling, women had no opportunity to think through their options in advance. Nor did they have any guarantee of safe treatment on arrival in Britain.

The real issue is the might for women to discuss pregnancy and be referred to a country where abortion is legal, should they want it.

The relevant court hearing will happen before the end of this year. The legal costs are estimated at £20,000. If the action is successful, both clinics face restriction, if not closure. Help defend this invaluable service by making a donation, however small,
