

It is a great honour to be able to launch the first-ever Hackney Irish Festival, being held between 4-12 February 1989. I have long looked forward to the day when the Irish in Hackney could come together to celebrate a unique cultural heritage and identity with an exciting programme of events that would tempt even the most unadventurous out-of-doors.

The richness of Irish talent on display is impressive. It is a celebration of all things Irish, from the first Annual Sean McBride Memorial Lecture to entertainment from internationally — renowned musicians; from paintings to Gaelic sports; from Irish language theatre to video-screenings; from writers' events to advice sessions; and from Irish cabaret acts to ceilis.

Hackney Council has given some financial backing for the festival, and we have had the support of some Irish businesses, but even so it has all been put together on a shoestring budget. What we have lacked in cash, however, we have more than made up for in the talent, expertise, energy and hard work invested by local Irish people in the project. Our thanks are due to them for making this festival an undoubtable success.

Over the centuries generations of Irish people have rolled up their sleeves, got to work and helped build up this country. It was not just bricks and mortar, motorways and the London Underground they helped build, either. They contributed in every sphere of life, from nursing the sick to fighting for a better deal for working class people within the Trade Union movement. And nowhere was their contribution felt more than in the East End of London.

But the Irish got little thanks. Today, as much as ever, we are targets






for hostility and prejudice, our labour is exploited, our views suppressed and our culture ridiculed.

In spite of this, the Irish identity is alive and strong — not just surviving, but developing all the time. Pride and interest in our Irish history and culture is an expression of this identity. We hope the festival will help provide a much-needed focus for Hackney's 20,000 Irish residents.

People are already beginning to talk about making the festival an annual event and also about forming a new organisation to bring attention to the needs and aspirations of the Irish in Hackney. Check the programme for details of a Public Meeting on March 1 to discuss this idea.




