



Irish Emigration - A Programme for Action

House of Commons Launch

The AGIY have secured all party support to launch "Irish Emigration - A Programme for Action" at the House of Commons on Monday 13th March 1989 at 12.00 noon.

Mr. Bernie Grant Labour MP for Tottenham, Mr. Peter Temple-Morris Conservative MP for Leominster and Simon Hughes Democrat MP for Southwark and Bermondsey are sponsoring the event.

The report which was jointly published by the AGIY and TIDE the Dublin based Emigration Research and Action Group presents the findings of two Inquiries into Emigration in Dublin in 1987 and in London in 1988. The report makes a series of recommendations to authorities in London, Ireland and the EEC on how issues around contemporary Irish youth emigration could be tackled.

AGIY meets Fine Gael

In January the AGIY had a meeting with Fine Gael party leader Alan Dukes TD and party Chief Whip Jim Higgins TD who were in London on a fact-finding visit to Irish community groups. Among the issues raised were the effects of the new social security changes on Irish 16/17 year olds, the effects of funding cuts on the work of Irish groups in the voluntary sector, the high levels of homelessness amongst Irish youth in London and the difficulties experienced by young Irish people seeking employment.

Fine Gael were lobbied to (1) demand an increase in the Irish Government's allocation of money for Emigrant Services Abroad and (2) to support the requests from Irish groups in Britain for an allocation of monies from the National Lottery Scheme.

Fine Gael expressed concern and agreed to support both requests.

DION money doubles!

DION, the Irish Government's Committee based at the Irish Embassy has received an increase in its grant monies in this year's budget. The grant from the Irish Government has doubled from £250,000 to £500,000!

DION have announced that the money will enable it to support the work of existing agencies and other voluntary organisations seeking to offer advice and counselling to Irish emigrants in areas which do not already have such services. The money will also be used to fund research and information projects.

Agency Profile

AGIY INFO will from time to time feature the work of one particular agency in London in order to assist other agencies understand the role and work of a particular organisation. In this edition we feature the work of the Short Stay Young Homeless Project (SSYHP) at 525/527 Holloway Road, London N19 4BY (Tel. 272 5383).

525/527 Holloway Road is managed by SSYHP who also manage a short stay hostel in South Kensington. Although the Holloway Road project is run by SSYHP it is not, confusingly, short stay at all!

Holloway Road provides accommodation for young people between the ages of 16 and 25 who require an absolute minimum of support. The project cannot offer accommodation to people who are unable or unwilling for any reason to lead independent lives. Licences are issued initially for three months and then, all being well, on a twelve month renewable basis. All residents are classed as boarders for DSS purposes.

SSHYP have adopted an Equal Opportunities Policy and fully welcomes applications from women, people from all ethnic backgrounds and gay men and lesbians.

525/527 Holloway Road is divided into two separate houses. 525 is a large shared house which accommodates 14 people in single and shared bedrooms. 527 houses four flats which provide accommodation for 3 or 4 people in single and double bedrooms.
