Dear Mr. Walsh..

(i) I telephoned this morning to the National Council for Civil Liberties, and said that I might not be able to attend owing to a previous engagement; and that I had suggested you to go along...

The lady who replied said if asked at the door you could give my name, (I am a member) as sponsor.

(ii) It is possible that activities in Northern Ireland will come into the Report, or that at your time it will be possible to ask whether anything has been done to follow up the Report on Northern Ireland.

This is the chief British agency concerning itself with the problem, and I think it would be well of your organisation and its representatives...

Last year I asked a question such as is suggested here. There would have been no objection to the subject.

(iii) It was very nice seeing you, and thanks much for your invitation to dine, as far as the tea... I think you know one of the most difficult problems in trying to tackle it's simple in itself; but no one has ever succeeded in doing anything about it!

I would only add upon letting you of the difficulties in making any one (if Northern Ireland "settler state") understand the subject, a letter arrived me from Belfast, describing the difficulties of an old Presbyterian elder with no effect.
