Dear Miss Flannery,

Mr. Hickey has asked me to write to you to thank you for your letter of the 19th inst. We are very glad that you will be able to arrange for a dozen girls to make a collection at the meeting on the 28th. Armlets are being prepared by Mrs. Begley, but I shall have to write to the Gaelic League for the use of about a dozen collecting boxes. Mrs. Harten Molony offered to get them at the last Council Meeting, but now finds that he is unable to lay his hands on any. Do you think you could manage to arrange this also? If so, I shall send somebody down to your office to collect them when I hear from you.

With regard to advertising the meeting, the Council do not anticipate any great trouble in getting 1,300 people to come. By the time the meeting comes off, five branches will be going in London, and these should supply a good proportion of the attendance. Over the week-end 10,000 leaflets were distributed at churches, etc., (though probably not at all churches owing to the rush), and we are making arrangements to distribute another 20,000 before the 28th.
