Dear Mr. O'Donoghue,

Your name has been recommended to me as one who would be interested in the Anti-Partition of Ireland League which was established recently in Great Britain to inform public opinion in this country in favour of the abolition of Partition.

I enclose herewith a statement of the aims and objects of the League, and a membership form which I hope you will fill in and forward to me if you are interested.

Branches of the League exist already in Highgate, Stepney, Clapham, Stamford Hill, and Hammersmith and an effort is being made to organise a branch in Willesden. I have been in touch with Father T. Fitzgerald of Willesden Green, and he suggested to me that you might be willing to help in the formation of the Willesden Branch. I should like to see you about this matter, and to discuss with you what the function of the branch would be, and how you would be able to assist us.

The League, I must emphasise, is entirely independent of all other Organisations, and welcomes as members all Irish people and all English people who believe that Ireland should be united. Naturally enough, it must rely upon the Irish for solid support as nearly every English person needs to be converted.

I sincerely hope that you will favourably consider supporting us in Willesden, and I shall look forward to hearing from you with a view to arranging a meeting.
